

# HISTORIC CHURCH SWEPT BY FIRE AT LONG VALLEY; ALL BUT WALLS DESTROYED

DAMAGE IN BUILDING USED BY PRESBYTERIANS SINCE 1832 ESTIMATED AT UP TO \$50,000 VALUABLE STAINED GLASS WINDOWS LOST

HISTORIC LONG VALLEY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ON THE MIDDLE VALLEY-CALIFON ROAD ABOUT SIX MILES SOUTHEAST OF HACKETTSTOWN WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE. ONLY THE FOUR STONE WALLS OF THE 122 YEAR OLD BUILDING REMAINED STANDING. FIREMAN FROM FIVE COMPANIES FOUGHT THE BLAZE FOR ABOUT FOUR HOURS.

IT WAS THE FIRST MAJOR FIRE IN THE HISTORY OF THE BUILDING. THE CHURCH WAS ERECTED IN 1832 AFTER A FIRE LEVELED THE OLD GERMAN VALLEY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ON THE SAME SITE.

A FOUR MONTH PROJECT OF REDECORATING THE CHURCH WAS COMPLETED IN DECEMBER 1952. MRS. VERNIE HOFFMAN OF LONG VALLEY, A MEMBER OF THE CONGREGATION FOR 42 YEARS SAID STAINED GLASS WINDOWS MADE IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA AND INSTALLED IN THE CHURCH IN 1832 WERE AMONG THE MOST PRIZED MATERIAL LOSS IN THE FIRE.

IT WAS REPORTED BY OTHER MEMBERS OF THE CONGREGATION THAT THE CHURCH OFFICERS RECENTLY HAD RECEIVED AN OFFER OF \$5,000 FOR THE WINDOWS. ALSO DESTROYED IN ADD-ITION TO THE CHURCH FURNITURE WAS A PIPE ORGAN PLACED IN THE CHURCH ABOUT 40 YEARS AGO AND A CHANDELIER MORE THAN 100 YEARS OLD WHICH RECENTLY WAS CONVERTED FROM ILLUMINATION BY KEROSENE TO ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

FIREMAN ESTIMATED THE DAMAGE AT BETWEEN \$35,000 AND \$50,000 BUT EMPHASIZED THAT AN ACCURATE FIGURE COULD NOT BE ARRIVED AT BECAUSE OF THE VALUE OF OLD FURN-ISHINGS AND ARTICLES IN THE CHURCH.

THE FIRE WAS DISCOVERED AROUND 1:30 O'CLOCK BY SGT. JOHN TURNER AND TROOPER THOMAS BARNA OF THE STATE POLICE STATION AT NETCONG. THE TROOPERS WERE PATROLL-ING IN THE AREA. THEY NOTIFIED LONG VALLEY FIRE CO., FIRE COMPANIES FROM SCHOOL-EY'S MOUNTAIN, HACKETTSTOWN, FAIRMOUNT AND CHESTER RESPONDED TO A CALL FOR ASSISTANCE. THE STATE POLICEMEN SAID THEY SPOTTED FLAMES AT THE MAIN DOOR AND A FRONT WINDOW OF THE CHURCH BUT WITHIN TWENTY MINUTES FLAMES WERE VISIBLE ON THE ROOF AND AT SIDE WINDOWS.

MEMBERS OF THE LONG VALLEY FIRE CO., REPORTED THE FLAMES WERE OUT OF CONTROL SHORTLY AFTER THEY WENT INTO ACTION. THEY SAID THE INTERIOR WAS A RAGING INFERNO AND THE FLAMES APPEARED TO LICK FROM ALL PARTS OF THE BUILDING AT ONCE. THE FLATTOPPED BELL TOWER AT THE FRONT OF THE BUILDING CRASHED THROUGH THE CHURCH ROOF SHORTLY AFTER THE FIRST FIRE COMPANY BEGAN FIGHTING THE FLAMES. IT WAS THEORIZED BY FIREMEN THAT THE FIRE ORIGINATED IN THE OIL BURNER WHICH WAS LOCATED IN THE FRONT END OF THE BASEMENT.

SIX PIECES OF APPARATUS WERE USED TO PUMP WATER FROM THE NEARBY SOUTH BRANCH OF THE RARITAN RIVER. FLYING EMBERS IGNITED A NEARBY TREE AND THREATENED LONG VALLEY INN AND THE BARNS OF STANLEY S. ANDREWS, LONG VALLEY FIRE CHIEF. THE FIREMAN TRAINED THEIR HOSES ON THE NEARBY BUILDINGS TO PREVENT SPREAD ON THE FLAMES.

THE AUXILIARY OF THE LONG VALLEY FIRE CO. SERVED HOT COFFEE TO FIREMAN.

THE CHURCH CONGREGATION NUMBERING ABOUT 100 PERSONS AND A LIKE NUMBER OF MEMBERS OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL HELD SERVICES FOR FOUR MONTHS IN THE LONG VALLEY MUNICIPAL BUILDING WHILE THE CHURCH WAS BEING RENOVATED AND REDOCORATED, MEMBERS SAID. THEY RETURNED TO THE REFURBISHED BUILDING IN DECEMBER OF 1952. THE PROJECT INCLUDED DIGGING A BASEMENT, ADDING NEW LIGHTS, REPAIRING BROKEN BEAMS IN THE CEILING OF THE MAIN AUDITORIUM AND PAINTING. THE NEW BASEMENT WAS PUT TO USE AS A SUNDAY SCHOOL.

THE ABOVE IS FROM "A PEEP AT OTHER PEOPLE", WHICH IS A BOOK OF POEMS PUBLISHED BY GEORGE S. DUFFORD, COPYRIGHT 1928. AND IF EVER A POEM PAINTED A PICTURE OF ITS WRITER THIS ONE DOES. GEORGE DUFFORD NEVER LOOKED FOR THE HOLE IN THE LEAF. LIFE WAS NOT TO BE WASTED THAT WAY. HE LIKED TO LOOK FOR THE BEST IN THOSE ABOUT HIM AND MAINTAINED AN ACTIVE INTEREST IN EVERYTHING GOING ON. AS A MATTER OF FACT IF IT HAD NOT BEEN FOR ONE OF HIS INTERESTS WE WOULD NOT HAVE HAD EITHER THE DUFFORD OR SWACK-HAMER ANNUAL REUNIONS. IT WAS BACK IN 1926 THAT HE ORGANIZED THE DUFFORD REUNION WHICH HAS CONTINUED TO MEET THROUGH THE YEARS AND IN 1941 HE ORGANIZED THE SWACK-HAMER REUNION. WE CAN WELL REMEMBER BEING ASKED IN THE SPRING OF THAT YEAR IF WE WOULD BE INTERESTED IN SUCH A PROJECT. AND WE HAVE BEFORE US AT THIS MOMENT OUR OWN COPY OF THE FIRST LETTER HE SENT OUT. HE HAD FORMED A COMMITTEE AND WAS ACTING AS THE SECRETARY. "HOW MANY OF YOU", HE ASKED IN THE LETTER," KNOW THE NAME OF THE FIRST SCHWACKHAMER TO SETTLE IN THE LONG VALLEY, N.J. HOW MANY KNOW THAT TODAY HE SLEEPS IN AN UNMARKED GRAVE".

WELL ALL THAT IS CHANGED NOW FOR AS A DIRECT RESULT OF HIS EFFORTS A SIMPLE TOMBSTONE WAS PLACED AT THE GRAVE IN 1942. AND IT SEEMS NOW EXCEPTIONALLY FITTING AND PROPER THAT THE COMBINED SWACKHAMER AND DUFFORD GENEOLOGICAL SOCIETIES SHOULD DO THEIR BEST TO HONOR, IN THIS ISSUE BOTH DUFFORD AND SWACKHAMER.

LET US LOOK FOR A MOMENT AT THE GENEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND OF THIS REMARKABLE MAN, WHO WAS POET, HISTORIAN, WRITER OF SPECIAL ARTICLES AND SPEAKER-MUSICIAN AND MINSTREL MAN, HUNTER OF NO MEAN ABILITY, EXPERT WITH THE PAINT BRUSH, TELEGRAPHER AND ONCE A DEPUTY SHERIFF OF MESA COUNTY, COLORADA.

HIS FATHER WAS ELIJAH, HIS GRANDFATHER, GEORGE, AND HIS GREAT-GRANDFATHER WAS GEORGE STEPHEN, A SON OF JACOB AND HIS DELAWARE INDIAN WIFE. JACOB WAS A SON OF PHILIP DU FORD (DUFFORD) WHO LANDED AT PHILADELPHIA FROM THE SHIP ROBERT AND OLIVER ON SEPTEMBER 11, 1738 AND AFTER TAKING THE OATH OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE ENGLISH KING FOLLOWED THE DELAWARE UP TO THE MUSCANETCONG, UP THAT TO AN OLD INDIAN TRAIL (ABOUT WHERE THE BRIDGE NOW SPANS THE RIVER NORTH EAST OF HACKETTSTOWN) AND THENCE OVER SCHOOLEY'S MOUNTAIN TO THE LONG VALLEY. IN THIS VALLEY WAS ALREADY (SINCE 1730) THE SWACKHAMER TRIBE (SCHWACHHAMMER). SAMUEL, THE PIONEER HAD AMONG HIS MANY CHILDREN A SON JOHN (JOHANNES) WHO WAS THE FATHER OF JACOB WHO HAD PHILIP WHOSE DAUGHTER SUSAN WAS THE MOTHER OF OUR GEORGE DUFFORD. SO YOU CAN SEE THAT HE WAS OF THE SIXTH GENERATION FROM EACH OF THOSE PIONEERS.

GEORGE WAS BORN ON JULY 31, 1864 IN THE OLD HOUSE ON THE MIDDLE VALLEY FARM!

HE WAS TWICE MARRIED, HIS FIRST WIFE HAVING DIED. HIS SECOND WIFE, (HATTIE SWACKHAMER) STILL ENJOYS THE MOST EXCELLENT HEALTH AND RESIDES AT 675 WEST FRONT STREET,
PLAINFIELD, N.J. HE HAD THREE DAUGHTERS, MARJORIE LOGAN, OUR PRESIDENT AND ELIZA
HARRIMAN, OUR SECRETARY-TREASURER ARE TWO AND THE OTHER IS DELIAH, WIFE OF WESLY
MOREN: HE DIED AUGUST 26, 1945. GEORGE CAME FROM A FAMILY OF BIG MEN BUT HE WAS
SMALL IN STATURE HIMSELF. HE OFTEN REMARKED "I WAS THE RUNT OF THE FAMILY". BUT
HE MADE UP FOR IT IN HEART. EARLY IN LIFE HE DECIDED NOT TO BE A FARMER SO HE LEARNED TELEGRAPHY.

IN 1886 HE OBTAINED HIS FIRST JOB WITH THE N J CENTRAL RAILROAD AS TELEGRAPH OPERATOR AT CHESTER, N.J., AT \$33.00 PER MONTH. THE TITLE CARRIED THESE DUTIES WHICH HE HAS ENUMERATED, "BESIDES DOING THE OPERATING I WAYBILLED ALL OUTGOING FREIGHT, CHECKED AND STORED FREIGHT RECEIVED, SOLD TICKETS, MADE OUT TICKET AND FREIGHT REPORTS, SWEPT THE WHOLE SHE-BANG AND KEPT THE KEROSENE LAMPS IN ORDER. MY SCHEDULE WAS FROM 6 AM TO 7 PM IF EVERYTHING WENT ACCORDING TO SCHEDULE --- IT FREQUENTLY MISCARRIED." IT IS OF INTEREST TO NOTE THAT AT THAT TIME THE IRON MINES IN THAT DISTRICT WERE REALLY ACTIVE FOR HE NOTES THAT HIS STATION HAD A STANDING ORDER FOR 35 GONDOLAS PER DAY TO SHIP THE MINED ORE. FOR RELAXATION HE PLAYED THE CORNET IN THE LONG VALLEY BAND. ONE WONDERS, THAT HE HAD ANY WIND LEFT AFTER THE DAYS WORK HE HAS OUTLINED. UNDOUBTEDLY, IT WAS HIS LOVE FOR MUSIC FOR, THRU THE YEARS, HE BECAME A VERY VERSATILE MUSICIAN. IN LATER YEARS HE ORGANIZED AND CONDUCTED THE DUTCH ARMS, THE ELKS, THE INTERNATIONAL AND THE SPICER COMPANY BANDS OF PLAINFIELD. HE WAS ALSO A BANJOIST AND MUCH IN DEMAND AS AN END MAN FOR THE VALLEY MINSTREL SHOWS. IN HIS LATE YEARS HE WAS PIANIST FOR PLAINFIELD'S OLD GUARD.

HIS PUBLISHED RECOLLECTIONS OF WHEN HE USED TO "SLING" MORSE WITH INVENTOR THOMAS A. EDISON ARE WELL KNOWN TO PLAINFIELDERS AS THEY WERE PART OF HIS WRITINGS PUBLISHED EXTENSIVELY IN THE COURIER NEWS. ONE OF HIS PRIZED POSSESSIONS WAS A LETTER FROM CHARLES EDISON, THEN SECRETARY OF THE NAVY, TELLING HIM OF THE THINGS HE REMEMBERED IN ONE OF HIS ARTICLES AND ADDING "I AM GLAD TO HAVE IT FOR MY COLLECTION OF EDISONIA."

HE FIRST MET EDISON WHILE TOWERMAN FOR THE PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD AT MENLO PARK, WHERE EDISON DEVELOPED THE HABIT OF STOPPING AN HOUR OR SO FOR AN EVENING TO LEARN THE NEWS GOING OVER THE WIRES. OWING TO HIS DEAFNESS, EDISON DID NOT GET THE MESSAGES BY SOUND BUT BY PLACING HIS FINGERS ON THE RELAY POSTS AND RECEIVING THE MESSAGES AS IT PASSED UP HIS ARMS. HE WAS TO HAVE MUCH CONTACT WITH EDISON LATER WHEN HE WAS MANAGER OF THE TELEGRAPH OFFICE AT NOLAN'S POINT, LAKE HOPATCONG, AND THE INVENTOR WAS MINING ORE BY ELECTRICITY AT OGDEN, LATER NAMED EDISON. A PRIVATE TELEGRAPH WIRE CONNECTED THE IWO POINTS.

ANOTHER INVENTOR, WILLIS CARRIER, A PIONEER IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF AIR CONDITIONING WAS A LONG TIME CLOSE PERSONAL FRIEND. TODAY ONE MAY SEE THE NAME CARRIER IN
EVERY TOWN IN THE COUNTRY. THEY HUNTED TOGETHER EACH YEAR, SOMETIMES AT CARRIER'S
PLACE IN CANADA FOR DEER, AT OTHERS IN PENNSYLVANIA FOR GROUSE AND ALSO ON THE
MIDDLE VALLEY FARM WHERE PHEASANT SHOOTING WAS ONCE GOOD.

HE TAUGHT MR. CARRIER TO SHOOT BIRDS AND IN THE EARLY DAYS IT WAS A PLEASURE TO HEAR THEM DISCUSS THE SHOTS MISSED BY MR. CARRIER, FOR HE WAS A MATHEMATICAL WIZARD AND TRIED TO SHOOT ON A MATHEMATICAL BASIS. ONE DAY HE MISSED A SHOT IN AN OPEN FIELD AND TURNING, SAID RUEFULLY, "Now GEORGE, YOU SAID A BIRD LIKE THAT FLIES SO MANY FEET PER SECOND. HERE I WAS ON A 40% ANGLE AND IF I LED HIM BY SO MANY FEET, JUST WHY DIDN'T I GET HIM?" TO WHICH GEORGE REPLIED, "IF, LIKE I KEEP SAYING, YOU WOULD QUIT FIGURING THE TIME OF FLIGHT AND THE ANGLE AND JUST LEAD THAT BIRD BY TEN FEET, YOU WOULD HAVE HAD HIM - AND A HELL OF A LOT MORE FUN TOO."

AT ONE TIME HE WAS STATION AGENT AT PALISADE, COLORADO. HAVING ALWAYS BEEN A CRACK SHOT, HE ENLARGED HIS HUNTING SCOPE BY BECOMING A DEPUTY SHERIFF OF MESA COUNTY. THIS ACTIVITY BROUGHT MANY ADVENTURES AND A PAINFUL BULLET WOUND.

IT WAS DURING THIS PERIOD THAT THE EVIDENCE OF HIS TALENT FOR WRITING EMERGED.
IT ORIGINATED FROM LETTERS HE WROTE BACK HOME WHICH WERE PUBLISHED IN A LOCAL PAPER.
BEFORE LEAVING PALISADE, HE FOUND TIME TO CORRESPOND FOR THE OLD NEW YORK WORLD AND
SEVERAL NEW JERSEY PAPERS. RETURNING TO NEW JERSEY, HE WORKED FOR SEVERAL COMPANIES.
DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR HE SUPERVISED THE EXPERIMENTAL USE OF PAINTS BY THE
STANDARD AIRCRAFT COMPANY, AFTER WHICH HE WENT WITH THE CARRIER ENGINEERING CORP.,
WHERE HE REMAINED UNTIL HIS RETIREMENT.

FROM THAT TIME UNTIL HIS DEATH, HE SPENT HIS WINTERS AT HIS HOME IN PLAINFIELD, N.J., AND HIS SUMMERS IN HIS ANCESTRAL HOME IN THE VALLEY. THIS WAS BUILT IN 1747 AND IS WORTHY OF MENTION. THE LATH WERE HAND SPLIT, WITH INCH THICK PLASTER MADE OF LIME, SAND, CLAY AND COW HAIR. THE FLOOR BOARDS ARE INCH AND A HALF OAK. IN MAY OF 1940 WHILE MAKING SOME REPAIRS IN THE CEILING, HE DISCOVERED AN OLD AMERICAN FLAG 4' BY 7' MADE OF BUNTING CARRYING SEVEN RED AND SIX WHITE STRIPES, A BLUE FIELD ON WHICH ARE TWELVE SMALL STARS AND A LARGE WHITE STAR IN THE MIDDLE OF THE FIELD.

THERE WERE OTHER FINDS TOO, NOW THAT HE HAD THE TIME TO LOOK AROUND. AMONG HIS FATHER'S PAPERS HE FOUND THE OGIGINAL COVENANT ENTERED INTO BY THE CONGREGATIONS OF THE EVANGELICAL REFORMED CHURCH AND THE EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCHES OF DUTCH VALLEY, NOW THE LONG VALLEY. THESE FINDS MUST HAVE INTENSIFIED INTEREST IN HIS FOREBEARS FOR, FROM THIS PERIOD ON, HIS LIFE WAS DEVOTED TO SEARCHING FOR INFORMATION REGARDING HIS ANCESTORY AND WRITING THE HISTORY OF THE OLD DUTCH VALLEY. HE BECAME AN AUTHORITY ON ITS HISTORICAL ASPECTS AND MANY, MANY DESCENDANTS OF THE OLD SETTLERS CALLED ON HIM FOR INFORMATION AND TO CLEAR MOOT POINTS. HE WAS AN INDEFATIGABLE WORKER DURING THIS ERA OF HIS LIFE. BESIDES THE BOOK OF VERSE ENTITLED "A PEEP AT OTHER PEOPLE" HE WROTE NUMEROUS ARTICLES FOR THE PLAINFIELD COURIER NEWS AND WAS MUCH IN DEMAND AS A SPEAKER.

When it was proposed that his beloved valley be inundated for a huge reservoir, he successfully led the fight to defeat the project. On the 200 anniversary of the founding of the Long Valley, his historical research provided the material for the pagaent which wound down over the road from Schooley's Mountain. Descendents of the Early settlers came from all over the country for the day long celebration which was conceived and directed by him. Papers said that "few", if any, like it were known in the annals of the State".

IT MUST BE SAID THAT HE NEVER LOST HIS LOVE FOR SHOOTING. HIS DAUGHTER TELLS
THE STORY OF AN IRATE NEIGHBOR CALLING TO COMPLAIN THAT HER HUSBANDS "LONG JOHNS",
WHILE BEING DRIED ON THE GLOTHES LINE, WERE RIDDLED BY SHOTS FROM AN AIR GUN AIMED
FROM THE DUFFORD HOME. INVESTIGATION DEVELOPED THAT "GRAMPS" HAD A HAND IN THE
TARGET PRACTICE --- AS AN INSTRUCTOR, OF COURSE HIS DESCENDENTS CAN WELL SAY OF HIM,

"HIS LIFE WAS GENTLE
AND THE ELEMENTS WERE
SO MIXED IN HIM,
THAT ONE CAN STAND
BEFORE THE WHOLE WORLD
AND SAY,
THERE WAS A MAN."
