GENEALOGY

The following letter from Mr. Arthur Swackhamer of Acton, Ont. reached us too late for the Fall Bulletin:-

"In reply to your letter of Sept 11, I want to tell you we enjoyed our visit very much indeed. We would have liked to have had more time to spend with you.

You asked for the history of our branch of the Swackhamer family as I told it to you at the gathering last July.

According to the Bulletin, Samuel Swackhammer and his wife Elizabeth had thirteen children. One son, John, born 1727, married Susanna Margaret Terryberry. Then also in the Book of Early Pioneers, shown us by Miss Marjorie Swackhamer of Long Valley, N.J., it says that John and Margaret Terryberry had three children, John, Christopher, and Samuel. Son Christopher married Kate Terryberry and went to Canada.

Christopher and wife settled near Grimsby, Ontario, on a farm on which they lived and raised a large family. I am not sure how many there were but I have heard of nine. On our way home last summer we stopped at Grimsby and visited the cemetary of the Anglican Church where Christopher and his wife are buried. The dates on the tombstone read: - Christopher Swackhammer B. 1768 - D. 1840. His wife B. 1772 - D. 1858:

Their eldest son Jacob, (My grandfather) served in the war 1812-1814 for which service he received a land grant of 200 acres. In 1819 he and his second wife, Mary Thompson came and settled on this farm near Acton, Ont. They had a family of thirteen children. Jacob also had two children by his first wife, Betsy and Ellen, making fifteen children, thirteen daughters and two sons, Christopher and Hiram. Betsy married Fred Terryberry and lived near Grimsby, Ont.

Christopher Swalkhamer's first wife was Elizabeth Denny and they had nine children, four sons and five daughters. Christopher's second wife was Esther Zimmerman who had two children, James Arthur Christopher and Clinton Bennett.

Arthur married Iona Grace Denny and they have a family of four sons and one daughter. Also ten grandchildren.
