ANTIQUe SHOP OWNERS COLLECT TOOLS

Mr. & Mrs. James Dufford, who own the Lamp Post Antique Shop on Route 547, Howell Township, N.J. and Mr. Raymond Davies who owns the 1807 Antique Shop at the same address received some very nice publicity in the Newark News of October 31 1965. The article written by Staff Correspondent, Colin M. Black, tells that these folks have an unusual collection of antique tools collected over a period of ten years, and quotes these owners as saying "Carpenter's tools have changed very little since ancient times." Mr. Davies said ancient Chinese and Roman woodworking tools are essentially the same as those used today by carpenters. The tools today are made of more durable materials and are frequently capable of doing more than just one job, but the basic principle of the tools is the same as their ancient prototypes.

Mrs. Dufford explained that antique wood planes could only be used to make certain kinds of cuts such as "roughingout" or molding cut. She said, however, that modern planes are more versatile.

Together, the Duffords and Mr. Davies have collected more than 350 antique tools searching from Maine to Florida. Their collection contains blacksmith tools, coopers' gouges for making barrels, 19th Century Early American wood dogs for securing timbers to a workbench, and wrought iron scrapers for barking trees.

One of their unique tools is a cast iron rope-maker that American farmers and sailors once found useful for twisting odd pieces of hemp into heavy lines.

Mr. Davies said most of the tools they sell are bought by collectors who have large private collections and by businesses who want them for display purposes. Once in a while a carpenter will buy a tool he needs to restore a panel or molding in an old house. Some of these tools are obsolete and just aren't made any more.

GREAT - Medical Men, Ministers, Scholars and Historians - take note.

Miss Gladys Swackhamer of Santa Barbara, California wrote she had been immersed in the past of her Mother's people in the Ancestral Stone farmstead in Western Maryland. She spent weeks reviewing books, professional journals, maps, letters, and other MSS belonging to her grandfather, Rev. George W. Anderson and her uncle, Dr. C. L. G. Anderson, a physician and historian.

The religious material, including a pulpit Bible for Museum display, went to the Gettysburg Theological Seminary Library. The historical and Spanish American Material in three languages to the James P. Monroe Memorial Library, affiliated with the University of Virginia, and the remainder of the 3,208 items to the Washington Ct., Md. Public Library. Indian artifacts and weapons and letter and note books of her great-grandfather, Jacob Winter went to the museum and archives of the Washington Ct. Historical Society.

The artifacts and weapons as well as coins and stamps were among the possessions of her uncle, who was a Medical Officer in the Spanish American War and First World War, and directed the American Hospital in Panama during part of the building of the Canal. Miss Swackhamer found copies of his life and letters of Vasco Nunez de Balboa published in 1941. Among her grandfather's college notebooks was a sermon in manuscript by Rev. Wm. Schumucker, founder and first President of Gettysburgh Theological Seminary, according to the librarian there.

In July, Miss Doris Dufford, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Frank Dufford of Succasanna, N.J. won first place in the New Jersey Grange sewing contest. The green cotton pinstriped suit was first judged at Flanders Grange No. 217 (the local grange) then at Pomona Grange on the County level for Class A (women over 18). The suit is New Jersey's in the National Grange sewing contest. Doris graduated from Roxbury High School in June and planned to enter Montclair State College to major in home economics.

Miss Marjorie L. Swackhamer of Schooleys Mountain Road, Long Valley, N.J. died suddenly of heart trouble on August 3, 1965. She was 56.

Born in Long Valley on April 19, 1909, Miss Swackhamer spent all her life in that community. She was the daughter of the late William T. and Wilhelmina Holt-husen Swackhamer, descending from the pioneer settlers of Washington Township.

Graduated from Hackettstown High School in 1927 and Douglass College, New Brunswick in 1931, she was a member of Zion Lutheran Church, the Long Valley Historical Society, the College Women's Club of Chester and the New Jersey Association of Public School Business Officials.

At the time of her death, Marjorie was secretary of the Township Board of Education, a position she held since August 1, 1961. For many years she operated the Ford Agency and Garage which had been established by her father. She also was engaged in the insurance business.

Marjorie attended the Swackhamer-Dufford reunion on July 24th and cheerfully greeted members of her family. She was a past treasurer of the Association.

Her only survivor is a brother, Robert L. Swackhamer of Laconia, New Hampshire

Funeral services were conducted by her pastor, the Rev. Charles L. Ziegler. Burial was in the Naughtright Cemetery.

Mr. Edwin Dufford of Gladstone, N.J. died on October 24, 1965 at the age of 89. He was born in the Dufford homestead in Middle Valley, N.J. He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Freda Treblicock of Gladstone with whom he lived, Mrs. Hattie Dufford Heede of Maplewood, N.J. and Mrs. Wilma Meyer of Hollywood, Fla. He was grandfather to seven and great-grandfather to twenty-four. Interment Chester Cemetery, Chester, N.J. In lieu of flowers it was requested contributions be made to the Lower Valley Presbyterian Church in Califon, N.J.

Howard Gardner Swackhamer of Springville, Pa. went with the Lord on May 4, 1965. He died of a heart attack following the flu. His was a life devoted to his wife, Myra and their four foster children.

Howard was the son of John Tufford Swackhamer and Licella Gardner, grandson of George Swackhamer.

Over 200 paid their respects to the family and signed the register.

Mrs. Lynda White of Washington, N.J. passed away March 28, 1965. She was one month short of her 92nd birthday which would have been on April 28th. Her sister, Hattie Suydam, married Philip Dufford for his first wife. Daughters, Mrs. Ottis Lance (Mae) of Washington, N.J. and Mrs. Mildred Coban survive.

Belated, but for the record, we have just learned of the death on July 22, 1964 of Nancy Tiger Barge. Mrs. Barge was 43 years old and one of twin daughters of Elmer S. Tiger of Hartford, Conn. Mrs. Barge was survived by her husband, Dr. Henry F. Barge and seven children.

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Mr. Laurimer L. Henry died in Kankakee, Ill. on January 7, 1965. He was 76. He had been in failing health for several years.

Laurimer was born in Kankakee County and resided there all his life. He is survived by sons, Dr. Laurin L. Henry of Charlottesville, Va., Mr. Richard Henry of Flint, Mich. and a sister, Miss Marian F. Henry of Loveland, Colo. Mr. Henry's grandmother Henry was a Dufford.

Mrs. Elizabeth Lewis Swackhamer, widow of Frank Swackhamer died August 26, 1965 at the age of 95. An account of her life and death written by her son, Milton Swackhamer of Levittown, Pa. follows:

"The Monday after the last family reunion, I received word that my mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Swackhamer, who since her stroke in the fall of 1963 had been living at the 'Garden Nursing Home' in Phillipsburg, N.J., had lapsed into a coma and was being sent to the hospital at Somerville, N.J. and was not expected to live very long. However she remained there for ten days and was sent back to the Nursing Home where she died on August 26th. I saw her every day at the hospital and I believe that just once she recognized me. She would have been 96 on October 15, 1965, and it is astounding how long she lived (a full month) after all hope had been given up by the doctors.

But then my mother was a remarkable woman. Let me tell you about her. She was born in Philadelphia, Pa. in 1869 and brought up in Lambertville, N.J. Her father, John Lewis, disappeared and her mother died when she was still a young girl and she went to live with an uncle.

At 14 years of age she had finished what schooling was necessary in those days to qualify one for teaching and applied to a member of a board of education for a job. Tears came to her eyes when the man told her he felt she was too young, and as a consequence he gave her the job anyway. And so she started to teach in the old one room country schools.

Mr. grandfather, Rulif Swackhamer, of Whitehouse was Hunterdon County Superintendent of Schools in the 1880's and one of his daughters, Maria, met my mother at 'Teachers Institute' and invited her home to the farm for a weekend. There she met my father and sometime later they were married. While I was still a babe-in-arms my mother followed by father out to New Mexico where he was a foreman on a ranch and around to various other places ending up in Galveston, Texas in time for the great flood of 1899. After they lost everything when our house was washed away we all came back to Plainfield, N.J. where we lived until my mother went back to teaching when I was six years old. She taught all eight grades, and I went to school to her in the third through sixth grades. Then she was engaged as a primary grade teacher in schools in Raritan (now Edison) Township in Middlesex County, N.J. We lived in Metuchen.

My mother continued to teach until she was sixty-five when she retired and moved to Trenton to be near me and my daughter, Diana. You should have seen the way she loaded her every year with Christmas gifts. I can remember once when Diana couldn't think of a present to ask for, she had everything she knew about.

During the Second World War when my mother was seventy-five she took a job (to augment her small teacher's pension) delivering telegrams. However she had to give it up because so many of them were about sons being killed in battle and she couldn't stand to see the anguish of the bereaved parents.

Since both my wife and I worked for the 'State of New Jersey' my mother was such a help when Diana started school. She had help of all kinds to offer Diana in her lessons and she took her to school in the morning, gave her lunch at noon in her apartment and picked her up at night. It solved what might otherwise have been a great problem.

She lived in and took care of her own small apartment until she was 92 when due to an injury suffered while walking in down town Trenton, it was necessary for her to give up her little apartment and come with me. After her stroke she went to live at the "Garden Nursing Home" in Phillipsburg.

She had a long and useful life and I miss her.

The funeral was held at the Hauck Funeral Home in Whitehouse and she was placed in her family burial plot in Lambertville.

When I think of my mother I always think of two things. She started to teach just before she was fifteen. She retired when she was sixty-five. That was a span of fifty years. She must have taught so many children. She tried so hard and I do know that some followed in her footsteps and became teachers.

The second thing was her never ending willingness to do things for other people. She was always so eager, never could do enough. If the people of the world were all like her there could be no wars. People would be so busy helping one another there would be no time to fight.

Yes, my mother lived a long time and she was a very good and useful person. It is nice for me to think about."

"The Year 1768 - Sept. 11, Fifteenth Sunday after Trinity. A large congregation assembled in Zion Church, New Germantown, and I baptized a number of children. After the sermon I examined and confirmed the following persons who renewed their baptismal covenant and pledged faithfulness: (No. 10) Anna Rosina Schwachheimer 17 and her sister (no. 11) Elisabeth 17, daughters of Conrad Schwachheimer."

The item about the Revolutionary War record (Summer 1954 Bulletin - pg. 9) created quite an interest and kept your editor busy putting researchers in touch with one another. It seems there is a problem - to prove which of the several Jacob Duffords living in this period the record belonged to. The record in question is actually a voucher for and payment of services rendered.

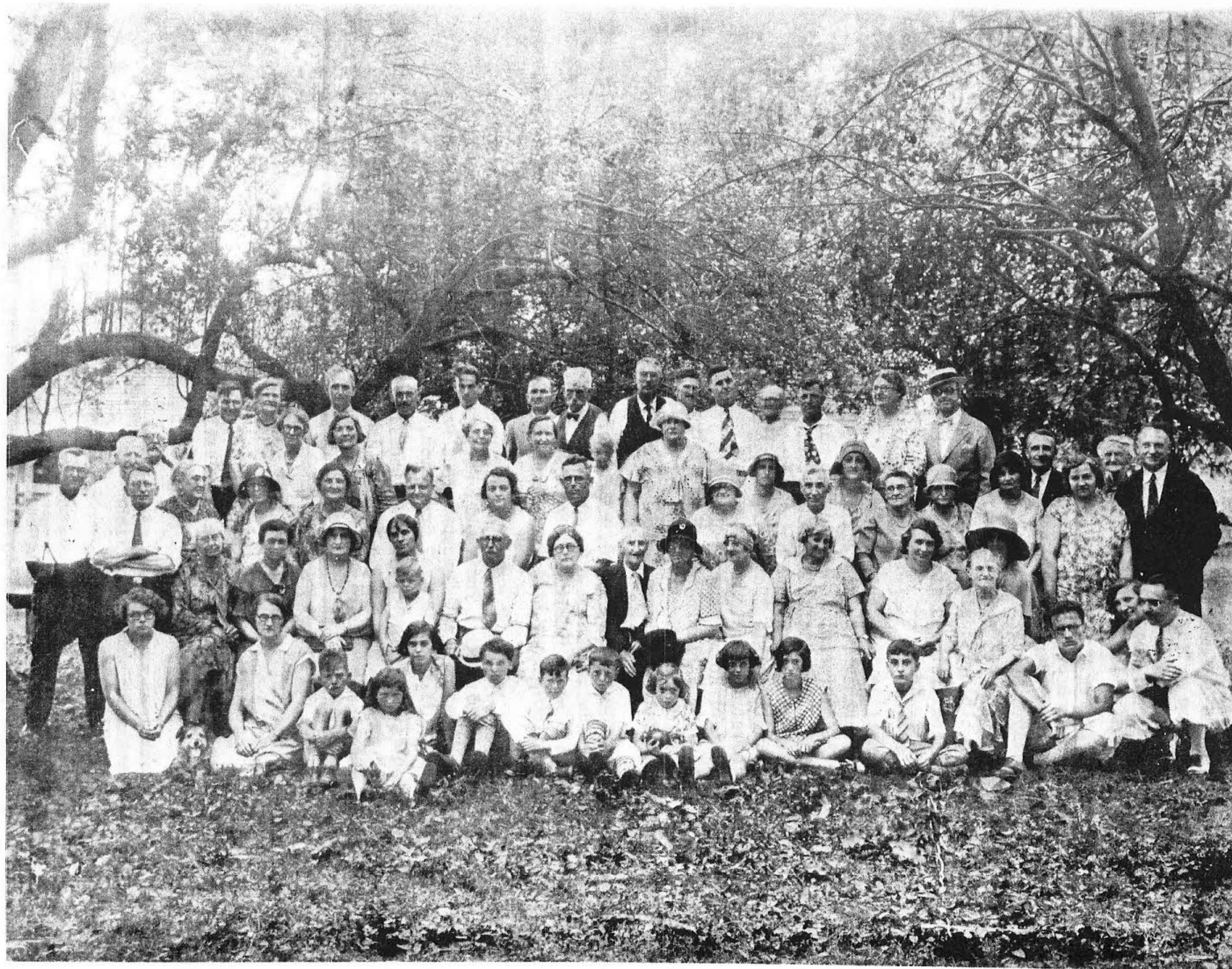
