EXCERPTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE REUNION

editor.

It is regretted that some portions of the minutes must be deleted. - Ed. "The twenty-second annual combined reunion of the Swackhamer-Dufford Genealogical Society was held at the Zion Lutheran Church, Long Valley, New Jersey, on July 26, 1969 - a dull, overcast day in the middle of the rainiest part of the wettest July in New Jersey since 1889. The weather, plus the numerous regrets received by the officers prior to the reunion date, had led them to fear for its success. Nevertheless, fifty-two persons signed the reunion register, among them some 'firsttimers,' and a guardian angel, ancestral spirit or force of some kind animated those present to make it one of the liveliest meetings of recent years.

After the traditional picnic and informal morning gatherings, at 1:00 PM President Stanley Dufford of Cedar Grove, N.J., asked for a moment of silent prayer for those deceased during the year just passed, for the ill and inform and those facing danger, and then Dr. Sharp Trimmer asked the divine blessing for the gathering and the family members, wherever they were.

The secretary read the minutes of the meeting of July 27, 1968, which were approved as read.

The treasurer reported that, following the appeal in the last issue of the "Bulletin" for members to send in their dollars for their subscription, the treasury was no longer as anemic as it had been. It is to be hoped the family members will keep those dollars coming. The teasurer pointed out the injustice to suppliers of services in holding their bills for one whole year to have payment authorized one by one at the annual meeting. A motion was made, seconded and apapproved to accept the treasurer's report as read. Then a motion was made, seconded, and approved to authorize the treasurer to pay bills when received after contacting the other officers. The meeting voted to increase the contribution to Middle Valley cemetery to \$7.50 (from \$5.00) and to make a contribution to Zion Lutheran Church of \$25.00. A paper money collection was taken to defray these and other expenses connected with the reunion.

Following the treasurer's report a digest of greeting and regrets from absentees were read (deletion of particulars here-Ed.)

There was no old business.

Despite the recommendation of the president and the secretary that it was desirable for the family to elect new people to office at frequent intervals, it was the unanimous will of those present that all the officers be re-elected for another year. The secretary was directed to cast the necessary ballot.

The business meeting was then adjourned.

Then the President, Stanley Dufford, called upon each of those present to introduce himself and to state his family connection. Some very moving moments occurred as some of the members related family anecdotes. Some of those present in their 80's recalled meeting, as children, ancestors who were then in their 80's (or 90's). Suddenly genealogy came alive. It ceased to be merely a table of names in a book and became a connection with a vital, vibrant past.

Mr. Ronald Crater (a Swackhamer), of Livingston, N.J., gave a short talk on the area around Standing Stone, Pennsylvania, where a large number of Swackhamers live. The region had been a refuge for Marie Antoinette, who, unfortunately, never reached it. Slides and a hand-viewer went around to illustrate points made in the talk. Miss Eleanor Romaine reminded those present that the branch of the Swackhamer family in the area of Standing Stone would be having its own reunion on August 10, 1969.

Following this talk the reunion divided itself into small groups, exchanging news and pleasantries. Slowly and reluctantly members left, some of whom later paid a visit to the old stone church and to the Middle Valley cemetery.

WHAT TO SEE WHEN TRAVELING ABOUT

THE LOYALISTS

The Loyalists Monument at Hamilton, Ontario, Canada honors the thousand of fearless men and women whose loyalty to the British Crown led them to have the U.S. at the close of the Revolutionary War. The great emigration of 1784 saw these outstanding people (Swackhamers and Duffords among them-Ed.) leaving their comfortable homes and properties to enter the Canadian wilderness. In many areas they were the first white settlers and with their descendants they have made a significant contribution to Canada's development and prosperity.

STANDING STONE

Azilum (Standing Stone) began in 1793, where emigres from the French Revolution traveled up the Susquehanna to the vicinity of Standing Stone, an old Indian marker resembling a petrified tree stump, and founded a 2,400-acre colony.

When the state government of Pennsylvania purchased 280 acres of the settlement 12 miles southeast of Towanda in 1968, it provided funds to reconstruct and redevelop the historical site. During the week the gatehouse museum is open to the public. During weekends, visitors can attend a spinning exhibition and go on tours.

FETED ON RETIREMENT

Friends of Harold L. Gunther (D), nearly 400 strong, turned out to honor the retiring chief engineer of the North Jersey District Water Supply Commission. The testimonial was held in the Empire Room of Wayne Manor, where a cocktail hour was followed by a banquet.

Guests included commission members from participating cities and their wives, commission employees, relatives and a wealth of friends the Gunthers have made over the past 31 years he served as engineer.

Mr. Gunther was presented with a gold wrist watch and his wife, Dorothy Walker Gunther, with a white orchid corsage.

Accepting the gift, Harold expressed his thanks to the commissioners, the committee, his co-workers and hosts of friends who participated in the testimonial. He added that he was looking forward to relaxing at his Lake Mohawk home with his wife and family, down to the fourth generation twin boys born on his birthday this year.

Members of the Gunther family were introduced - Mr. and Mrs. Robert Anderson, of Ramsey, daughter and son-in-law; Mr. and Mrs. Russel Sorge, of Ramsey, grand-daughter and grandson-in-law; and Mrs. Gunther's sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Archie Hover, of Ho-Ho-Kus, N.J.

Harold Gunther was born in Paterson, and was graduated from Paterson High School. He received his BS degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Cincinnati, and did graduate work at the University of California and at Rutgers University where he took specialized courses in the water field.

Professionally Gunther served as assistant engineer during the construction of the Great Notch tunnel which runs from Little Falls to Clifton, New Jersey. He also helped supervise construction of the viaduct that crosses the reservoir on Westbrook Road, and the "balancing" reservoir in Clifton, and on the Wanaque aqueduct where he directed the line and grading from Wanaque to Belleville, and supervised the construction of the section from Clifton to Belleville.

He was assistant engineer when the Raymond Dam was under construction at the vast Wanaque reservoir.

When these projects were completed in 1931, Gunther was laid off with the other engineers. He was then employed on the Newark Transit Bureau, and in 1936 went with the Port Authority, working in an engineering capacity on the second tube of the Lincoln Tunnel.

The 1940's saw Gunther doing defense work in Panama Canal, then on the Man-hattan Project in Oak Ridge, Tenn., and with the Kaiser ship building war effort on the West Coast. He returned to Wanaque in 1945 when the Ramapo pumping station was being planned at Pompton Lakes. He was appointed chief engineer in November, 1956.

As a hobby, Mr. Gunther has researched and charted the Dufford Family Genealogy....yards of it.

READ THIS AND BE FOOTSORE

Your editor heard the story going the rounds at the reunion and wrote Mr. Milton Swackhamer of Levittown, Pa. to confirm it. This is his reply:

"I belong to the Hopewell Valley Golf Club which is adjacent to a little place called Marshalls Corner where my mother once taught school many, many years ago.

I am not a top flight golfer, playing mostly in the upper eighties, but I enjoy the game very much and since I've always had good legs have played quite a bit. In June of 1961 I played 72 holes in one day and the next year a young golfing friend of mine was talking to me about it. He said he thought it was pretty good for an old guy like me but what he'd like to do would be to play from sunrise until dark and see how many holes we could get in. His name was Ed. Cervone and he suggested that we pick a day in June and try it. To make a long story short, we picked June 4, 1962 and played exactly 100 holes. We started at 5:25 AM, and finished at 9:05 PM in what was practically dark.

Sometimes I think it gave me a reputation of being some sort of 'nut' for people still say to me 'How many holes did you play today?'

My birthday is on the 14th of October and beginning in 1963 I started celebrating it by playing my age, which that year was 66. And this, I continued to do each year until this year (1969) when because the days get shorter in October, I decided to simply celebrate my 72nd year and play it in June when the days are the longest.

Johnny Belluardo, the Pro at Hopewell, mentioned the fact to a sportswriter for the Newark Evening News by the name of 'Red' Hoffman and he decided to send down a photographer.

I started at 6:15 AM on June 18, 1969 and again my companion was Ed. Cervone who was now a little older himself (being in the middle thirties). We had just finished 36 holes when the photographer appeared. He took a number of shots and they all turned out well. The next day the Evening News carried two of them.

Then the surprising thing happened. They put the pictures on the wire service and they went around the country. The paper here in Levittown, the Courier Times, ran them with their own caption. The New York Daily News raun them and a Philadelphia paper called and questioned my wife about it. Then a month later, one of the pictures appeared in the Baltimore Sun. But, what surprised me the most was that I was on the first tee the following Sunday when a friend told me that he and his wife had checked into a motel in Vermont a couple of nights before and when they turned on the television my picture was just being shown.
