Mr. Jennings graduated from Princeton University in 1919 where he was a member of the Ivy Club.

In tradition of Military service which ran strongly in the Gould family, he became a Naval Aviator with International No. 323 in World War I and was stationed at Brest, Pauillac, Montchie and L'Abervrach, France.

Mr. Jennings descended from the Jennings and Gould families of Fairfield, Conn. (Since the 17th Century). He inherited a sword used by his great-great-grandfather, Colonel Abraham Gould who led a small group against a large battalion of British.
