AUGUSTINE COLLECTION

Several thousand photographs from New Jersey's historic past were presented to the Rutger University Alexander Library in New Brunswick, N.J. They were the gift of William Augustine, a retired newspaper photographer and New Jersey history buff.

Mr. Augustine formed a working companionship with the late Henry Charlton Beck and for eighteen years the two men traveled together to every county and corner of New Jersey, compiling a weekly feature series for the Newark Star-Ledger.

The Rev. Henry Charlton Beck's prolific pen and Mr. William Augustine's photographs gave Jerseyans an awareness of their heritage.

THE CHURCH THAT REFUSED TO DIE

There is no post office, school or general store but the church founded in 1838 by the Rev. H. Denny, Swackhamers, Gibbons, Masales, Harris and McCutcheon families stands fast - just 2 miles north of Acton, Ontario, Canada.

Six years ago the farming community of Churchill, a crossroads of the Town and Third Lines, Esquesing and Erin townships was split on the decision to close historic

Churchill United Church by Halton Presbytery.

The 135-year old church pulled out of the United Church rather than be closed by its presbytery and amalgumated with Trinity United Church, Acton. It made sense for the handful of families to worship in the big town church where there were more

activities, more of a youth program.

But it didn't make sense to those families. They said they wouldn't go, and it turned out that presbytery couldn't make them. For when lawyers got out the deed to the property, they found it placed ownership in the trustees and their assigns, forever, and never was turned over either to the Congregational Church before 1925 or to The United Church of Canada after.

The congregation voted to withdraw from the United Church and to organize under the Ontario Companies Act as a community church. The Churchill people say presbytery

took their record and put them in Archives.

The people's givings are enough to pay expenses and make contributions (through the United Church) to such causes as Biafra, Bangladesh, the Sid Gilchrist Fund and the summer student program Caravan. The church is served by the Rev. A. Walter Fosbury, a United Church minister who retired in 1969. Mr. Fosbury keeps up United Church ties and would like this congregation to return to the United Church some day.

Ever since the pullout, the Churchill church has grown and its young people have retained strong interest in its program. A four-piece string orchestra accompanies the organist and there is a choir of twenty or so, most of them teenagers. The pews are filled with the congregation's 40 families, some of them new folk from the city, some with roots in the church, and community that go back to its settlement 135 years ago by United Empire Loyalists.

Why do they come to the little country church when they could worship at the big

town church? They say, because it's more friendly.

The Church that refused to die is a plain frame church, freshly painted white, shaded by elms, the kind that used to dot so many corners in rural Ontario. The date over the door is 1838. Members of the church defend the pull-out by such expressions as "God had plans for us here" and "Things can get too large."

CREDIT FOR THE CONTENTS OF THE ABOVE goes to Miss Diane Swackhamer, Acton, Ontario, Canada. Diane is the great-granddaughter of Jacob Swackhamer, who settled at lot 32, con 3 Esquesing Township after the War of 1812, and who was one of the founders of Churchill Church. Miss Swackhamer sent an article which appeared in THE ACTION FREE PRESS Wed., September 12, 1973.

Dr. Trimmer was born in Middle Valley, N.J. in 1891 and graduated from Lafayette College in 1913 and from the University of Pennsylvania Medical School in 1918.

Dr. and Mrs. Trimmer went to China in 1922 where he was one of the heads of Nanking Hospital under the regime of Chiang Kai Shek working as a medical missionary for the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Church. Mrs. Trimmer was a tutor to Madam Chiang Kai Shek's nephew and his children, and taught English to servicemen in the Chinese military academy.

In 1951 when the Communists invaded and his wife had already been sent home, Dr. Trimmer came home on the Gripsholm, which proved to be the last ship out for evacuees. He and his family later went to Pakistan where he served six years.

Following this Dr. Trimmer worked for the Board of Foreign Missions until shortly before his death.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Ruth Barkman Trimmer, a son John Morris Trimmer of Gainesville, Fla.; a daughter, Dr. Mary Spinks of East Aurora, N.Y., a sister Mrs. Mable Apgar of Califon, N.J., and eight grandchildren.

Memorial services were held in the chapel of the First United Methodist Church, Montclair, N.J.

GENEALOGY

We are indebted to Mr. Harry Marsales (F) of 36 North Drive, Buffalo, N.Y. for the following record which is proof of the burial place of Christopher Swackhamerson of John and grandson of Samuel, the progenitor.

Letter is dated January 19, 1974 and addressed to Mr. Marsales at his winter

address, 2514 53rd St., South, Gulfport, Florida.

Letterhead is St. Andrew's Church (Anglican Church of Canada) Grimsy, Ontario (Rectory, 154 Main Street, West) Rector-The Venerable J. Homer Ferris, B.A., L.Th. Bishop's Archdeacon in the Diocese of Niagara.

The letter signed by J. Homer Ferris, Rector reads in part:

"According to our records Christopher Swackhammer is buried in our Churchyard. In our record book there is the following entries for Range 11, Lot 11:

Christopher Swackhammer 1768 - 1840 Elizabeth Swackhamme 1772 - 1858

Walter, son of Isaac 1850 - 1850

& Catherine Swackhammer

Also according to our Church history there is the following reference made to the consecration of the present Church building:

"For another important date in the history of the stone Church, the writer is indebted to Professor Young of Trinity College, who writes that he finds in the S.P.G. (Society for the Propagation of the Gospel) records about Grimsby, 'Church Consecration July 27, 1828 by the name of Saint Andrew's."

1969 was the year of the 175th Anniversary of the Parish and a year of celebration.

Mr. Harry Marsales describes himself as the unofficial head of the Canadian Branch of the Marsales (spelled variously) family and one actively interested in the family genealogy. His letter dated July 29, 1973 made us aware of the closeness of the Marsales and Swackhamer families. In part, his letter reads:

"Peter Marselis lived as a Loyalist on a Crown Land farm in Clinton Twp., a new Grimsby-Beamsville in Niagara area. He married and had a family of ten who on maturity were qualified, as children of Loyalists, to apply for Crown Land. Three of the boys and one girl received land in Esquesing Twp. (now Acton area, 40 miles north and across the western end of Lake Ontario) - Stephen b. 1795, Mary b. 1797,

In the home district - Clinton Twp. - the Marsales had friendly neighbors named Swackhammer. Two of the boys married Swackhammer girls - Stephen married Susan and Peter married Catharine. They all, with the other two Marsales - Mary and George and wives moved to their Crown Land farms in Acton, Ontario area where they were active in community projects.

At least some of the Swackhammers got land in Esquesing Twp., as Peter II Masales and Jacob Swackhammer were together in building the little old historic church on Church Hill, Acton which is now a fine memorial.

I have a pretty good record of the Marsales family, but have a missing link. I have no record of Stephen Marsales b. 1795 and his wife Susan (Swackhammer) after locating in Acton and am hopeful that Swackhammer sources might fill in from their records."

Editor's note - we do not have a record of Susan Swackhamer who married Stephen Marsales nor Catherine Swackhamer who married Peter Marsales but suspect they were daughters of Christopher and sisters of Jacob Swackhamer. We would be happy to hear from anyone who could provide proof of this.

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WE ARE CONCERNED

Bill H.R. 4426 would force restriction of censuses, so that the public (who paid to have them done) will not be allowed to use them - ever! The 1790-1880 have been opened to the public, and are available in some larger libraries and Historical organizations. 1890 and 1970 have already been burned, and so are gone forever; some statistics were taken from them first, but this will not help the historians.

Censuses used to be open to the public after 70 years; it is now 100 years, and if this bill goes through they will all be destroyed, except for statistics taken from them.

If burned, not only genalogical societies and historians will lose out, but also minority groups who are just beginning to be really interested in their past, and their migrations caused by political situations.

NAUGHRIGHT CEMETERY

On August 18, 1973, the Tombstone Hounds of The Genealogical Society of New Jersey copied the tombstones in Naughright Cemetery, Naughright, Washiington Twsp, New Jersey. This record will be a part of that society's collection housed in the

Rutgers University Library, New Brunswick, N.J.

Naughright, a tiny village in the rolling farmland of Morris County, boasts a well kept burying ground dating back to the early 19th century. Although it is in use today, it is the last resting place for many of the members of the early families who settled Washington Twsp. which includes the Duffords and Swackhamers.
