EXCERPTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE REUNION OF THE SWACKHAMER-DUFFORD GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY:

The 27th annual Swackhamer-Dufford Genealogical Society reunion, picnic, and business meeting was held on Saturday, July 27, 1974, at Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in Long Valley, New Jersey. It was a mildly overcast day which made the church parish hall comfortably cool for the noon picnic lunch of cousins.

Immediately following lunch, a business meeting was called to order by Mr. Stanley Dufford, President. Twenty-nine adults and nine children were recorded as present. President Dufford opened the meeting by asking those present to stand for a moment of silent prayer for remembered departed relatives.

REPORTS

The minutes of the 26th reunion of July 22, 1973 were read and accepted as recorded. Treasurer, Mrs. Robert O. Hart, reported on the financial position of the Society.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Miss Eleanor Romaine gave an interesting report on several items of general interest. (1) She read a letter from Miss Diane Swackhamer of Acton, Ontario, Canada regarding Churchill United Church, the church that refused to die. (2) A letter was read from Mary and Harold Swackhamer and appreciation was expressed for their donation. (3) Acknowledgement was made of a note from Dr. Robert Trimmer regarding notice of our annual reunion which appeared in the "Genealogical Helper", a Utah genealogical publication. (4) Notice was made of the death of Mrs. Bessie Emmons at age 100 on July 18, 1974. A newspaper obituary was read by Milton Swackhamer, her nephew. (5) Announcement was made of a new book, Chester, New Jersey, a Scrapbook of History

by Frances Greenidge. The book contains an interesting reference to a Dufford's rum shop and the Swackhamer farms across the river.

BULLETIN AFFAIRS

Miss Romaine reported on the 1973 Bulletins indicating that higher postage and paper costs resulted in more expense than the year before even with a full page reduction in size. Further, requests for Bulletin items will be made in each issue listing a due date. No reminder postcards will be sent to members as has been done in the past.

President Dufford thanked Miss Romaine for her dedicated service and asked the memters to remember to send in news items at any time.

NEW BUSINESS

New business items included a report of the efforts of the Washington Township Historical Association to partially restore the remains of the 1774 old Union Stone Church in Long Valley across the street from Zion Lutheran Church. The restoration is the Association's 1976 Bicentennial project. They have set a goal of raising \$5,000 for this activity. Because of the important role old Union Church has played in the lives of many Swackhamers and Duffords, the Society voted to contribute \$25. toward the project this year and to review the progress at the 1975 reunion. Other new business consisted of voting donations to the following organizations:

It was further decided to ask Mrs. Lawrence Halleck to order more yellow due reminder slips and to include this expense as a part of the Bulletin costs.

Mr. Milton Swackbaner discussed correspondence regarding family cost-of-arms. It

was generally agreed that although the documentation might not establish authenticity of the Swackhamer-Dufford names, that such symbols of heraldry make interesting conversation pieces.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Noting the vacancy for the position of Secretary, an invitation was extended for a volunteer candidate. Sharon Swackhamer (Mrs. Gene L.) was nominated and elected as Secretary. Faving decided that the members present desired the present officers to serve another year, and that such officers were willing to serve, the Secretary was instructed to east a unanimous ballot for re-election of Stanley Dufford, President; James V. Wert, Vice-President; Mrs. Robert O. Hart, Treasurer; and the Rev. T. Cecil Swackhamer, Chaplain. Miss Eleenor Romaine was requested to continue as Editor.

PRIZES AWARDED

Silver dollar prizes were awarded to the oldest member present, Mabel Apgar, age 89; the youngest member present, Matthew Grover, age 2; and those traveling the greatest distance specifically to attend the picnic, Gene and Sharon Swackhamer and children, Sharyl and Jill of Vienna, Virginia.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further new business, a round-robin of introductions and farewell comments were made and the business meeting adjourned at 3:05 P.M.

EEECTED SECRETARY OF STATE

A letter dated December 8, 1974 from Joyce S. Sweckhamer (Mrs. William D.) from Carson City, Nevada reads in part: "After a hectic, but pleasantly tasteful campaign between a young genteman and my husband, Mr. Swackhamer was elected handily to the office of Secretary of State of Nevada. Since he was appointed to the office in January of 1973 this was his first State-wide race in all of his twenty-eight years of service to our State. The twenty-six years spent as an Assemblyman were Countywide races.

While Mr. Swackhamer was campaigning, I kept busy with my duties as DAR Regent of John C. Tremont Chapter, Carson City."

INTERESTING CAREFR AMEAD

In September, 1974, Jennette Sue Swackhamer stopped in Stamford, Conn. to visit her Uncle, The Rev. T. Cecil Swackhamer. Jennette is the daughter of the O.C. Swackhamers of Fairfax, Mo.

After the visit she went to France to study until June of 1975. Then will go to Cameroon, West Africa and be assigned to a tribe. The goal - learn and analyze the language produce a written system, teach a core group to read and write who can, in turn, teach others and translate the New Testament into this language.

Jennette is a graduate of Missouri University and a linguistic school in Dallas, Tex.

FOCUS ON ENERGY CRISIS

Union College in Cranford, N.J. offered a free five-week course on the energy crisis to county residents as a public service this fall.

The course was taught by Farris S. Swackhamer of Cranford, a professor of chemistry at the college and a former director of research with the Shell Chemical Co. in Union, N.J.

Professor Swackhamer, who developed the program, said he hoped the course would "peel away some of the emotion caused by the recent energy crisis and replace it with some facts about the energy situation in the world today."

JAMES SWACKHAMER AWARD

In May of 1974, the second annual James Swackhamer Award was presented by Mrs. James Swackhamer of Readington Township, N.J. to Marthe Rowen, an architecture student at Princeton University.

The gold medal was given to a second-year architecture student for an outstanding design. It was established in memory of James Swackhamer, a Somerville, N.J. architect, who was an active member of the Central Chapter of the New Jersey Society of Architects which gives the award.

DON'T DESTROY OLD OAK TREE

"I'm for saving the oak tree, said Mrs. Virginia Swackhamer, member of the Readington Township, N.J. Planning Board at the first hearing (in July, 1974) of Barna Associates' proposed eight lot subdivision off Route 523.

The planning board frowned on the recommendation of the township engineer to destro a tree which the developer wanted to save and to pave a proposed cul de sac island.

The engineer's office recommended getting rid of the tree to make it easier for the snow plow to do its work around the cul de sac island, but the board was behind its chairman who preferred "risking a little more work by the road department once or twice a year" to denuding the island.

BICENTENNIAL OBJECTIVE

The Washington Township (Morris County, N.J.) Historical Society hopes to save what ie laft of the historic Old Imion Church in Long Valley. N.J.

Full restoration would cost \$100,000. This amount is deemed impossible to raise so the group is now settling on a reachable \$5,000. goal to "point up" the walls - apply new mortar to keep the walls from deteriorating further - and lay a stone patio and altar in the center of the shell for use in church and community memorial services A stone masion has been working a few days a week since April repairing the walls. He works as money is found to pay him.

LOOKING BACK TO FEBRUARY 1944

Miss Theresa Hopler sent your editor a clipping from a North Plainfield, N.J. paper which has a picture of Samuel S. Swackhamer pointing to the date of February 12, 1944 on the calendar.

Samuel S. Swackhamer, at the age of 85, was preparing to mount the lecture platform in several New Jersey communities that week to speak on Abraham Lincoln, his idol and the man after whom he had modeled his life. Even in appearance, it is said, he resembled "The Great Emancipator." Samuel was tall, with an erect bearing and his appearance belied his age. Some called him "The tall sycamore from Somerset." He was born in Whitehouse, New Jersey and chose, as his profession, to become a lawyer. He took a fling at politics and served as Assemblyman from Somerset County. He gained a state-wide reputation for his oratorial ability.

AUTHOR OF A POEM - A SWACKHAMER

After the publication of the book Chester New Jersey, A Scrapbook of History by Frances Greenidge, we had great fun reading a poem (reprinted from a 1932 issue of the Morristown Daily Record) by George Praster. Thanks to Miss Theresa Hopler, George Praster has been identified as being a Swackhamer descendant - see page 518 of Early Germans of New Jersey by Chambers.

The following line was extracted by your editor from a copy of a document in The Public Archives of Canada designated "Dr. Charles Duncombe Papers" (M.G. 24, B 38). It should be noted that there are papers in this file that make some of the dates used herein questionable.

Charles Spencer Duncombe (s/o Thomas Duncombe and Rhoda Tyrrell)

He was a physician, Member of Canadian Parliament, and a Civic Leader both in Canada and California where he lived in his later years. He married a second time and had a son, but the boy died as a young man and left no children.

Eliza Jane Duncombe b. July 4, 1816 (or 1814) at Middlebury, Schoharie County, N.Y. m. Jan. 19, 1834 John Tufford who died 1900. They lived in Paris, Ontario, Canada.
