EXCERPTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE 32ND ANNUAL SWACKHAMER-DUFFORD GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY BUSINESS MEETING.

The 32nd annual meeting of the Swackhamer-Dufford Genealogical Society reunion was called to order on July 28, 1979, by the Vice President, James V. Wert at Zion Lutheran Church, Long Valley, New Jersey. Mr. Wert asked Dr. T. Cecil Swackhamer to open the meeting with a prayer of invocation.

Dr. Swackhamer gave a short talk on the need for the Bulletin and he stressed the importance for its continuity. He said so many people read it and he received a couple of calls within the last year from people who live out his way in Missouri, who have seen and enjoyed reading it.

We hear from our recent past President, Rev. Larry Brasher, that he and his wife Louise, are settled in Durham, N.C. where he is pursuing his studies in American Church History. His letter is dated September 15, 1979 and Larry said it had been very hot and humid in Durham. He has been away from the classroom for six years but does not anticipate too much difficulty in getting back into the swing of things. He also said he was glad the Dufford-Swackhamer Society has an able new president and that he thinks the office should rotate often to encourage interest and participation. Rev. Brasher's new address is 2702 Elgin St., Durham, N.C. 27704, in case anyone would like to write to him.

Larry sent a little bit of nostalgia regarding his great-grandmother. She related the following anecdote which Larry's Dad taped in 1949: Harriet Skellenger Swackhamer Clark (1864-1955) tells the story, which is true. She is the daughter of Samuel and Juliet Skellenger Swackhamer, who lived on a farm in Ironia, near Chester New Jersey. At the time of the incident in 1884, Harriet had just been married to Lewis Clark and was living in Morristown. Harriet S. Clark was the great-grand-

mother of Larry Brasher.

"Well, we had a lot of nice neighbors---lots of 'em. And here was this snow on the ground. Lots of snow. Deep! And we said, 'Let's get up a sleigh-ride and go up to Grandpa Swackhamer's!' And we did. We had a four-horse sled. My husband and his brother George, you know, always had to go fishing in the winter time on the ice. (My father could stand up on the ice better than those boys could!') They was a-going fishing, and the rest of us was going on a sleigh-ride just to have a party up to Grandpa Swackhamer's.

"We had this four-horse sled and a two-horse, two-seated sleigh (the crowd did), and at a certain place (I could tell you just where it is, but you wouldn't know) you went down in a little holler, and then you come up the other side. Goin' up that upper hill, the four horses balked. They wouldn't go up the hill! And everybody in that big sled had to get out in the snow. Well, when we got to Grandpa Swackhamer's, they were soakin' wet, and the people had gone to bed, and there was no fire. (You know they had self-burner stoves. It might have been one.) And the boys built a fire and dried themselves off, and nobody went home 'til the next day, when it got daylight. And then the four horses went home!

"And George and Lewis and myself, we stayed. And Florence went home with me on the train. And the train was stuck right here in Denville. We stood there ever so long---didn't know why, you know. Why the train couldn't get through! Well, George and Lewis, they stayed up there to go fishin', and they stayed three days. Then they walked the fence to Denville. Got the train to come home. That's when they went fishing."

I have had your letter of 5.2.1979 to Mr. Centurier, Chairman of the German Hugenot Society, translated and will try to give an answer.

I have not been able to establish anything definite about Jacob and Philipp Dufford, who in all probability came from Mannheim or the Mannheim area, because the Church reports of Mannheim were destroyed during the war. At the moment, I can only give you the following information:

In my opinion, the name Dufford is identical to Dufour or Du Four. The name Dufford, or Duford as it really should be spelled, does not occur among the Palatine Hugenots. In contrast, the name Dufour is found time and time again. This name has its origin in the communal bakery found in most villages where the farmer families each baked their own bread and cakes. The bakery foreman, who also collected a tax from the farmers for using the bakery, was called Dufour (or Du Four) (i.e., "of the oven" or "of the hearth" -- translater's note).

The register of the French Reformed Church of Mannheim for 1665 shows: Pierre du Four. Also 1666. Because the Palatinate was burned down by the French in 1689 and the population had to flee, the majority of the population fled to Brandenburg-Preussen (Brandenburg-Prussia). Thus, we find for example, Peronne Du Four from Mannheim who marries Pierre Vibeau from Friesenheim (near Mannheim) in Magdeburg in 1710. And Sara Dufour from Oppau (near Mannheim), born in Oppau in 1663, who dies in Uckermark (Brandenburg) in 1734. There was a Dufour family in Buckow (Mecklenburg) in 1710, as well as in Malle, Danzia, and Berlin; all these families had their roots in the Palatine families. It appears that the Dufours fled from the Palatinate along with many many other Hugenots in 1639. A few of them fled to

the Nieder-Rhein (Lower-Rhine) and to Holland and emigrated from there to America. It was thus that the Master David Sylvester, who was married to Agathe Du Four, was transferred from Rotterdam to a post in Celle (Hannover) in 1729. Your ancestors Philipp and Jacob "Tofer" probably also belonged to this branch of the family (i.e., to the Holland Dufours - Trans.)

I do not know for sure what the origin of the Dufour family is. In any case, they seem to belong to the group of 'Walloons' who emigrated from the Spanish Netherlands (what is today northern France and southern Belgium) to the Palatinate.

There was a Bankhaus Dufour ("Dufour Bank") in Leipzig, which belonged to Pierre and David Dufour. David came from Waadtland (Switzerland). It is, however, very possible that he had only spent some time there while fleeing, or that he was born there while his parents spent some time there while fleeing. I do not know if these Dufours from Sachsen (Saxony) belong with those of the Palatinate. The name Pierre is noteworthy as it was very common among (all the) Dufours.

I personally have an ancestor Judith Dufour, who married Hans (or Jean) Vautrin, the Mayor of Kirberg (Lower Alsace, today the Bas-Rhin Department of France, the region which neighbors on the Palatinate). I do not know where her family origins were.

I will try to discover some additional information about the part of the Dufour family in which you are interested and will write to you as soon as I have anything useful.

Unfortunately, I cannot write to you in English, but I think that you will be able to have this letter translated.
