GENEOLOGY

Russell Dufford sent a 30-page letter to Annette Hart, plus maps. From a list of 125 Dufford names taken from a "History of the Dufford Family" by Beatrice Bayley, Russell has written to some and received a reply from Duffords in Newberry, S. C. They are very interested in our group and wish to find their connection to us. These Duffords can trace their line back to Frederick Dufford (1795-1846), Butler Co, Pa. Many kin on our mailing list can trace their line back to the late 1700s or early 1800s to Pa. but can't connect to our Philip. Philip's son Adam went near Easton, Pa. and had 3 sons, George Henry, George Ernest & Philip; their birthdates are 13 Jan. 1768, 16 May 1772 and 4 April 1776 respectively. This is on record from some of the first settlers of "The Forks of the Delaware and their descendants", Rev. Henry Martyn Keiffer, DD. First Reformed Church of Easton, Pa. 1760-1852. Adam Dufford was unable to write.

The name Dufford as we know it today has become changed over the past 300 years. DU is French and means "OF THE", ford is English, they came on an Irish Boat, so perhaps the "d" was attached then. Fort is German and since Philip was a Major in the Prussian Army the "t" was added. The original name was DU FOUR. Four means oven or furnace in French. In those times, 1700's, there was a community oven where local folks brought their bread, cakes, etc. to the community oven to be baked. So our forefather tended the oven or watched the bread that it wouldn't burn.

The following is from Mrs. Hyde of Rockwood, Ont. Canada. Christopher is the grandson of the first Samuel Swackhamer that settled in the Valley in 1730 and helped the Duffords to get started as they came in 1738. Mrs. Hyde also lists many of the following generations and we will see if any inquiries come in to us.

NOTES ON JACOB

Served in the 1st Flank Company of the 4th Lincoln Militia believed to have been aide d'camp to General Brock during the War of 1812 (unvalidated) petitioned for and received a grant of 100 acres at Lot 32 Concession 4 county of Halton in the district of Gore - order in council is dated June 2, 1819, full deed granted 7/29/1839.
