The Head - German symbol. <u>Upper right</u> - Cross stands for the Pilgrim religion - Lutheran doctrine mostly; olive branch peace; American Eagle is the symbol of the colonies; <u>Lower left</u> Wheat - the farmers who were our ancestors; <u>Lower right</u>, the English Crown - before 1776 - King of England.

From a Dutch friend of Russell Dufford comes the following:
The name Dufort is of French origin, meaning of the fort - strength
powerful. Phillipes means tree hacker, taken after a trade some
of the people were doing. Dufford is the Angleized form. The
name Boomhouer was Phillip's mother. In the 1700's a Europe was
full of professional military men who hired themselves out to the
highest bidder, poor economic conditions at home had these people
fighting wars wherever they were needed. That large numbers of
soldiers came from the province of Hessen and the Black Forest area
and from Switzerland. Russell Dufford has written to the
Netherlands again on this soldier bit and will keep in touch.

"YOUTH IS A GIFT OF NATURE: BUT AGE IS A WORK OF ART"

A visit with Jeanette Dufford Pierson at Crestwood Nursing Home in Whippany on March 31, 1982, where the above quote was seen. Your editor spent about an hour and half talking with Jeanette who was 86 years old on May 5. Happy Birthday Jeanette! It was a most enjoyable visit as I learned something about my grandparents whom I never met. They died before I was born.

Mrs. Pierson told me she was born 4 months after the death of her father Charles Dufford who was the son of Henry Dufford of Middle Valley. Charles died of typhoid fever. Some time after the death of her father, Jeanette's mother married Philip Swackhamer. Philip was a widower with 3 or 4 children. Jeanette has one sister, Marge, who lives in Clifton. Marge was married to Rufus Rittenhouse and she and her husband have three children (2 daughters and one son). They also have 12 grandchildren.

Jeanette and her sister went to Trenton Normal School where they both were educated to become teachers. She taught for 2 years at Highbridge before marrying Howard Pierson. Howard was a builder and the two homes that the Pierson's lived in, in Morristown, were built by Howard. Both homes are on Early Street.

Mrs. Pierson said she so much enjoyed visiting my grandparent's store in Hackettstown when she was a youngster. Her mother would take her there with her sister Marge. Anne and John Wert had a bakery and according to Mrs. Pierson, my grandmother always had the table set in the rear of the store ready for visitors and family alike. She was always prepared to set out a little repast for travelers. Jeanette speaks very highly of my grandparents and said that everyone really enjoyed them.

Mrs. Pierson has three children. Louise White who lives in Morristown, a daughter living in Ogdensburg, N. Y. and a son who lives in Iowa. Jeanette is a grandmother and a great-grand-mother.
