From February through April, Russell sent about 50 letters of inquiry to various Duffords through out the country. They went to addresses from several mailing lists showing some 190 Dufford families in the U.S., (3) three in Great Britain and one in West Germany. Fourteen were no longer at addresses given, and three (3) replied. One (1) reply was from Everett Dufford, Shell Rock, Iowa. Family migrated from Pennsylvania in 1800's. Tom and Mary Dufford, Collinsville, Illinois, from Franklin, PA with a possible connection to William and Delia Dufford who migrated to Mineola, KS in 1909.

Perhaps someone who reads this article can relate to these names and contact Russell, who welcomes letters and materials from the **b**uffords, relating to family history, marriages, etc.

Since 1951 his publications have involved lists of emigrants printed in Straussberger and Hinke's "Pennsylvanian German Pioneers" (a source accepted by Pennsylvania archives). Dufford, Neighbor, Weise, Terryberry, Schenkal and other original German Valley families who arrived in Philadelphia, September 11, 1738, on the Robert and Alice from Rotterham.

We are grateful to Jim Swackhamer for his extensive re-Sears in the Swackhamer archives - the latest was locating the birthplace of Samuel Swackhamer (see '92 Bulletin).

The birthplace of Philip and Jacob Dufford is still uncertain. Russell Dufford has consulted the Morman genealogy network in Roanoke, the Central Bureau for Genealogy in the Netherlands and is waiting a reply from a source in Germany, recommended by the Germany Embassy, and the arrival of microfilm from Altlubheim.

The following was sent to Russell Dufford by Mrs. Owen Mardis, Sr.(Marion), Box 505, Newcomerstown, OH 43832-0505. Mrs. Mardis is compiling a history of the Neighbor Family, soon to be published in book form. In Ohio, Duffords are Tuffords, and will be included in her book, as many of the early German families intermarried.

JACOB TUFFORD, retired farmer, P. O. Newcomerstown, was born October 2, 1806, Morris Co., N.J., and is a son (the only surviving member of a family of six) of John and Ann Tufford. He emigrated to this county at the age of ten years, and was married April 29, 1830, to Mary Catherine Flock, a native of New Jersey, born 29 December 1810. She was a daughter of John and Margaret Flock. Our subject (Jacob) is the father of eleven children, five boys and six girls, three now living -- John, Andrew and Elizabeth, of James Loder (Loader). He also has eleven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. His wife died January 27, 1847, and is buried in Newcomerstown, where his parents also lie. (This would be Margaret Swackhammer, since Ann Trimmer is buried in New Jersey.) -- the Pioneer Cemetery. Mr. Tufford has been a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church for fifty years, and has acted as Class Leader and Steward. He owns seventy-three acres of land in Oxford Township, and has known this county from the time it was a wilderness."

John m. (1) Ann Trimmer who died 4 December 1806. According to Chamber's "Early Germans of New Jersey", the children of John Dufford and Ann Trimmer were: Mary / James / Stephen / Theodore / John / Annie and Jacob. By his second marriage his children named were: Matthias. There were other children, not named, one especially was Susan, born 27 March 1810, New Brunswick, Hunterdon Co., N.J.; married here 1 May 1831, william H. Gardner. I have these descendants in another of my histories. (William's brother, Joshua married a daughter of Nicholas Neighbor.) I do find the puzzle of these early marriages rather fascinating. I hope to determine the names of others. I have heard or read somewhere that John Tufford had twelve children, so I feel there were others. The above biogrphical sketch shows that Jacob their youngest child was ten years of age when they came to Newcomerstown, which was 1816. This indicates that Ann died shortly after his birth (Oct. 2, 1806).

I find in the early marriages of Tusc. Co.: Elizabeth married William Harris, 5 May 1818, (Bk.1-3,p.31,#241 by Boaz Walton, JP.) Could this be Mary (middle name Elizabeth)? If she is a daughter of John and Ann, she would have to be one of the older daughters

to have been married in 1818.

Jacob and Mary Catherine's son John (called Sr. in his obituary) was born 6 March 1831, Oxford Twp. (I'm not sure if this is Tusc. Co., or Coshocton Co. The western end of Newcomerstown is in Coshocton Co. and this is where the Tuffords settled.) Nicholas Neighbor brought the first wagon train of emigrants to Ohio in 1815. In 1816 he returned to New Jersey and brought a second wagon train of emigrants. (I'm told there were several trips.) Malinda's obituary did not give her maiden name, only as Mrs. John Tufford, Sr. She was born 9 June 1836, Newcomerstown; died 3 June 1910. John and Malinda are buried in the East State Street Cemetery, here. Their children were: George / Herman / John, Jr. /Freeman Franklin/ James Loader. James C. Wilkin.

Freeman Franklin Tufford was born in 1856; died 5 Dec. 1906; married Sarah Elizabeth VanSickle (another old New Jersey name). She was born 28 Jan. 1864; d. 24 Aug. 1953; both are buried in East State Street Cemetery, here. I have all these descendants as Sarah Elizabeth is a daughter of Margarette Ann Neighbor and Samuel Van Sickle. Margaret was a granddaughter of William Neighand Catherine Swackhammer (sister to Margaret) -- and my bor husband's great-great-great-grandparents. Margaret's parents were 'Jacob Neighbor (s/o David Neighbor and Elizabeth Trimmer) and

Susan Neighbor (dtr/o William Neighbor & Catherine Swackhammer) They were first cousins.





Divided on "Georges," war splits families

The American Revolutionary War split the members of the Tufford family between the two Georges. Some decided that George Washington was their man, and decided to fight with him, others chose George III of England, and the United Empire Loyalist stand.

George the King, so he made his way to the still British Niagara Peninsula with three other families. The heads of these families were John Dillman, and Jacob and Christopher Culp, and the descendents of these men now make up a substantial part of the population of Lincoln.

They came in Connestoga wagons, along the lake. Conrad decided to settle at the bottom of what is now known as Tufford Road. He was given a 100 acre land grant by the Crown, but the land was quite free for the taking.

The stipulation on the grant was that the land be cleared of the natural vegetation, and adopted for agriculture. Despite this clause, Conrad chose the area with the biggest trees for his 100 acres. He reasoned that if those; big trees could survive on the land, the soil must be very fertile. So, despite the obvious difficulty and extra work of removing the huge" oaks and maples, Conrad persevered.

Conrad did clear his 100 acres, his farm prospered and expanded to six times the original size. His first house of logs was built hear the lake. Later he constructed a brick building to house himself and his family. The house still stands a little east of the end

of the present Turford Road's and some of Conrad's present day descendents once lived there.

One of these descendents reports that the house had a large living room with three bedrooms off it. There was a pantry and a huge kitchen, that seemed to be as big as the living room. The whole upstairs was divided into two bedrooms. The house had a cellar and there was another building close to the house which could have served as a root cellar, or a smoke house.

Conrad grew almost everything he needed to live. His crops are believed to have included wheat and oats, and he probably had a cow that he brought with him.

The lake and nearby streams provided fish. One assessor reports "Red Creek"— a stream of some magnitude, especially in the spring at which time it is swamped with smoker and mullets which are very good at this time and are caught in large numbers by the inhabitants."

Name origin
Tufford is an old name in
Lincoln, and it can be traced
to its very ancient European
roots. There are many
variations on the spelling of
the name, including Dufour,
du Four, Tofort, Duffort,
Dufford and Tufford. The
name has been definitely
established as being of
French Huguenot origin.

The French Huguenotte were the French Protestants. They lived in an uneasy peace with the Catholic majority of the country, and were persecuted from time to time. Charles IX ruled France in 1572, he was the som of Francis I and Catherine de Medici, the cultivated but ruthless daughter of Lorenzo the Magnificent.

The Huguenots were getting quite influential at the French court, much to the chagrin and displeasure of Catherine. She finally convinced her son, that the Huguenots were a danger to the monarchy and should be eliminated, and that is almost exactly what happened.

Early on the morning of August 24. August 24. August descended a Paris to wipe out the Huguenots. They worked efficiently and Huguenot blood flowed freely; the day is remembered as the St. Bare tholomew's Day Massacre.

Many of the Dufours fled France following the massacre. Some went to Hainhault, moder day Belgium, others went to the German Palatinate; along the Rhine river. Conrad Tufford was a Palatinate.

Philadelphia from Rotterdam, arriving in September 1738. They sailed up
the Musconetomy River and
settled in the Long German
Valley in New Jersey, now
known as the Long Valley.
There are many Tofforts and
others with variations of the

cemetery there.

Other Tuffords moved on to Easton, Pennsylvania and along the Delaware River. Then came the War of Independence and some made their way to Upper Canada. Jacob, Isaac, Joseph and Mary According to the 1841 census, Joseph had a family of 10, and Isaac had a family of nine. When Conrad's will was read, his property was divided between his wife and children.

Most of the Tuffords now living in this area can trace their ancestry to Conrad. Two of these descendents, Elma Tufford and Muriel Tufford, supplied most of the material for this story. Though the two Tuffords have not traced their ancestry completely to find a link between the two, they believe they will somehow manage to untangle their common ancestry soon.
