Dorothy Schwackhamer has been corresponding with John Reeves, Stittsville, Ontario, and received from him the following information to pass on:

Samuel's grandson, Christopher, his wife, Kate Terryberry, and young family, migrated to what was then called Upper Canada in about 1805, mainly because the Governor of the time was offering free land. They settled on 100 acres on the south shore of Lake Ontario, and Niagara.

His oldest son, Jacob, with second wife, Mary Maria Thompson, and his first three daughters settled on their own 100 acre grant in 1820, near the present town of Acton, about 35 miles west of downtown

Toronto. It was an untamed wilderness.

About the same time as Jacob, his brothers John, William and David, and sisters Catherine and Susan, with spouses, all settled on grants of land in the same area. Six Swackhamer families, all in cluster, all carving new homes and new lives in the wilderness.

RECEIVED FROM: J.W. (Bill) Roberts, Moody, AL, a beautifully presented booklet on the "History of the Dufford Family" tracing his descendants, including a family group sheet for deceased Rev. Paul Dufford.

There is nothing worse than a picky genealogist, but I noticed at the top of p.2 that Samuel settled in Long Valley in 1730. According to my research (Jim Swachammer has copies) he arrived on the "Love & Unity" at Martha's Vineyard in Dec 1731 after a disastrous voyage. They where suppose to have gone to Philadelphia. Samuel, his remaining family and others where detained in Mass. till Oct 1732 because of Court proceedings. When and how he arrived in Long Valley is a mystery. He and his wife Catherine where recorded as taking communion at St. Michael's (& Zion) Lutheran Church in Philadelphia, in the year 1735. This information was also from Annette Bergart! It's difficult to say if they were living there or just visiting from NJ.

The Francis Crawn Collection: A large collection of private research papers on Sussex County families, donated by Mr. Francis Crawn, a local genealogist.
