Minutes from the 56th Annual Meeting of the Swackhamer-Dufford Genealogical Society

July 27, 2002

Meeting was called to order at 12:35PM by President Audrey McCaffrey (D). A moment of silence was observed in memory of Dorothy Swackhamer and for all deceased members.

Each member introduced themselves to the group, telling their family affiliation, town, and other interesting information.

Minutes of the last meeting were read by Herb McCaffrey and were approved as read.

CORRESPONDENCE: An email from Lawrence Brasher was read. Mr. Brasher requested to be placed back on the mailing list to receive the bulletin. A letter was also read from Russell Dufford concerning the "Duffords of Germany".

OLD BUSINESS: Frank Dufford reported that the Middle Valley Cemetery is being well cared for and recommended that a \$50 donation be sent to the caretaker. A motion was seconded and approved for this donation. A motion was carried to send \$30 to the Washington Township Historical Society.

NEW BUSINESS: President Audrey McCaffrey asked for nominations from the floor for a new treasurer to replace Dorothy Swackhamer. There being none, Audrey proposed her daughter. Eileen Corritori (D), who happens to live in Long Valley and who had indicated a willingness to do this job. Frank Dufford made a motion, seconded by Jack Dufford, to nominate and elect Eileen as treasurer for the next three years. Eileen was elected unanimously.

Silver dollars were then presented to the following members:

Youngest attendee - Leigh McCaffrey (D) 18 months old.

Eldest attendee - Frank Dufford, 87 years old.

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Attendee traveling the farthest - Mr. and Mrs. Gordon (D) from Daytona, Fla.

Mrs. Ruth Alpaugh from High Bridge, NJ, gave a very interesting account of the last will and testament of her Great-Great-Grandfather George Dufford, made July 1st, 1864 who died in 1884. A synopsis of this story follows:

His wife, Elizabeth Neighbor Dufford, received the interest yearly on \$6,000, the house, and furniture, one cow of her choice, and one ox. His son George received the farm (Fox Hill), and the wood-lot. At the death of his mother, he would receive the annual interest on the 6,000. William received \$10,000. Lawrence (Ruth Alpaugh's Great-Grandfather) received the farm and part of the wood-lot. Elijah received the farm. Henry and his sister (Martha Ann Dufford Wert) each shared a dwelling, a store, a garden, the grist mill, and a lot across the river. Andrew received the farm and after the death of Martha Ann, he would receive her share. Leonard -Grandson Gibson at age 21, would receive \$1,000.

Ruth also recently sent a portion of her family tree, which we will shortly update on the S/D web site.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:23 PM

The Mystery of Georg Dieterich and Maria Magdalena Schwechheimer By James W. Swackhamer

In the book "Voyage of the Love and Unity" by Nancy E. Schanes, the author lists the following among the "KNOWN <u>PASSENGERS</u> ON THE LOVE & UNITY":

John Schwachammer

George Schwachammer

Samuel Schwachammer (wife Catherine and son Conrad)

Magdelena (wife of George) Shwchhammer/Schwchammer

Among the "KNOWN SURVIVORS OF THE LOVE & UNITY" she lists:

Among the "PLAINTIFFS IN THE ADMIRALTY COURT CASE" are listed:

Magdelena SHUICHHAMMER

John, George, Samuel SHUICHHAMMER (SCHWACHHAMMER)

From the above, we have plenty of evidence to know that:

Samuel is our immigrant ancestor, Samuel Friedrich Schwechheimer.

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Catherine is Samuel's 2nd wife, Anna Katherine Kuch. Conrad is the son of Samuel and his first wife, Eva Marie Hoffmann, Johann Konrad Schwechheimer.

That leaves John, George and Magdelena! Who are they and what happened to them?

In the early days of Nancy Shanes' research on the Love and Unity she mentioned to me that John, George and Magdelena were passengers on the ship. In viewing microfilm copies made by the Mormon Church of the records from the Evangelistic Church (Lutheran) in Altlussheim, Germany, I discovered the following entries:

> Page 132: Conrad Schwechheimer, b 6 Mar 1699. Father Georg Dieterich Schwechheimer, Mother Maria Magdalena Pontif.

Page 136: Johannes Philip Schwechheimer, b 9 Feb 1701. Father Georg Dieterich Schwecheimer, Mother Maria Magdalena Pontif.

With two sons born about the same time as our Samuel, it appears that George and Magdalena were at least 20 years older.

Not finding George and Magdalena in the records I had of the Church in Altlussheim, I wrote to the person with access to all the records to see if he could shed any light on the situation. He replied as follows:

"The records in the Altlussheim parochial register begin in 1584. Yet before this time Jacob Schwechheimer (died Circa 1588*), your direct ancestor, and Adam Schwechheimer (died after 1560*) ancestor of Georg Dieterich Schwechheimer (born Oct. 1652, died 14 Mar 1705*) had lived in Altlussheim. Unfortunately I couldn't find anything in regards to the relation between the two of them. It's not stated in the records."

We might not be talking about the same George Schwachammer who is listed as a passenger of the ill-fated ship. There are a lot of similarities, however. The Altlussheim Church Georg Dieterich Schwechheimer's second wife was Maria Magdalena Reiling (Married 24 Jun 1697*). She was the daughter of Caspar Reiling of Speyer. This does not match with the last name of Pontif as recorded by the Mormon Church microfilm.

The Altlusseim Church records list the same two sons of Georg and Magdalena with the same birth dates listed in the Mormon Church records. However, my correspondent states "The copies (of the records) also prove that neither Georg Dietrech nor his sons, Konrad and Johann Philipp emigreated to America. George Dietrich and Konrad Schwechheimer both lived and died in Altlussheim. According to the parochial register, Johann Philipp married and moved to Heidelberg and still lived there in 1753."

So there you have it. Who were the George, Magdalena and John that arrived on the ship Love and Unity? Where did they come from? Where did they go. Not all the passengers were involved in court cases. Many of the latter went on to Philadelphia on the ship Norris. Neither Georg, his wife Magdalena, nor their sons were listed among the Norris passengers. Could the Church records be wrong? Could they have used assumed names? Nancy Shanes notes "There are no further records of these persons."

Can anyone shed any light on this confusing situation?

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*Information added by the author, some of which came from family group sheets supplied by his correspondent from Germany.

Harry J. Swackhamer, who died in 1944, was a former mayor of Dunellen, NJ. He is the son of Rullif Swackhamer. His daughter is Sarah E. Nichols, and his son was Elmer Henry Swackhamer (b.4/28/1902 in Dunellen, NJ and d.6/1989 in Vero Beach, Fla.) Elmer's daughter (and Harry's granddaughter) is Ruth (Swackhamer) Almond. Ruth has framed papers regarding Harry's honorable discharge from the National Guard in 1888, and a red-ribboned badge from the Brotherhood of I.O.F. of Dunellen, NJ. Apparently, a portrait of Harry J. Swackhamer hangs in the Dunellen Town Hall.

Thank you to Diana Swackhamer of Montrose, PA, who sent us a lovely article entitled "Six generations of Swackhamers gather - visiting Great-Great-Great-Grandma". Diana was correct in saying that not many families in the US are ever able to gather six generations together. The full article will appear on our web site. Just before her passing, Helen F. Swackhamer was able to hold her new g-g-ggranddaughter, Janell Smith (3 wks old) at Beverly Healthcare, in Tunkhannock, PA. Diana became the g-g-grandmother. Janell's birth also marked another interesting quirk in the family tree. From Helen to Tara (Janell's mother), all the women in the family first gave birth to a female. Incredible indeed!

Long Silent, but Memories Remain

Chatterbox Club Was Just That

A Winter's night sleighride through rolling hills a strawload trek to an old mill girlish excitement over packing a picnic basket for her best beau.

This is memory's mystic band of bygone years, recalled this week by two former residents who were members of a young ladies' social group that flourished in Long Valley after the turn of the century—the Chatterbox Club of German Valley.

They are Mrs. Charles B. Green of 20 Hurley Ave. and Mrs. Elizabeth Welsh Crist of 727 Spooner Ave.

JNLY GIRLHOOD memories remain today. The Chatterbox Club has been defunct for more than 40 years. Many of its members are deceased. And German Valley has long since given way to the name Long Valley.

The reign of the Chatterbox Club was brief—only a decade or so. But into its abbreviated feam were crammed a variety of social activities typical of a small farm community of the early 1900s.

The club was a far cry from the bevy of multi-committee women's club of modern vintage. It had no officers, no committee chairmen, and fund raising was never a problem—its members chipped in whenever a fee was needed.

remarked Mrs. Crist. "That's how the club got started, and it's what prompted people to start calling us "that chatterbox girls' club."

Mrs. Crist said she organized the club in about 1906 to "give the young women of German Valley something to do."

The club met once a month, meeting in members' homes for a gabrest and sewing session. Members spent the evening swapping news from the "Valley" and planning social events:

PICNICS, sleighing songfests, community dances and card parties—all were on the schedule of the prim and proper young ladies of the Chatterbox Club.

"Turned out we made quite name for ourselves," said Mrs. Green. "Before long we had about 20 members and were receiving invitations, from neighboring clubs to visit them,"

A highlight of the cluh's activities came when members donned dusters and bounced over bumpy country roads in a new "horseless carriage," according to Mrs. Green.

WHAT CALLED a halt to the Chatterbox Club?

"Men—they were our downfall," said Mrs. Green. "We began inviting our young men friends to our parties, and before long word had spread through the 'Valley' that there were some pretty eligible young ladies over in German Valley."


This was the beginning of the end for the Chatterbox Club. The girls grew up, married and moved, and around 1916 the Chatterbox Club was silent.

TODAY, Mrs. Crist, a practical nurse for about 25 years, and Mrs. Green, retired after 42 years as a school teacher, offer this advice to prospective women's club organizers:
"You don't need all this high-newered entertainment for
