President Audrey McCaffrey (D) called the meeting to order at 12:45PM. Everyone introduced themselves with their connection to the Swackhamer and/or Dufford families. The group then observed a moment of silence for Frank Dufford and other deceased members of the S/D families.

Secretary Carol Martyniuk (D) read the minutes of the last meeting, and they were approved as read. Eileen Corritori gave the treasurer's report.

A BIT ABOUT OUR CANADIAN ANCESTORS by James W. Swackhamer

The book *Early Germans of New Jersey* by Theodore Chambers has been a must read for beginning genealogists because of its wealth of information and detail. However, Mr Chambers had a bad job of proof reading for there are many errors found in the datails. One of these concerned the father of one of our Canadian ancestors.

In the section on our immigrant ancestor, Samuel Friedrich Schwechheimer, Chambers lists John (Johannas) as Samuel's second child. He may not have available the fact that between Conrad, Samuel's first born, and John, there were four other children, who were born and died in Germany. Thus, John was really Samuel's sixth child. That's not so bad but he lists John as being born in 1827. This is strange for his father, Samuel, died in 1782. Since most of my research is confined to descendants of Samuel's first born, Conrad, I know little about John and his descendants. I know there was a lot of research done on John, so perhaps someone can shed some light on this issue.

However, this is not about John, but about Christopher, John's second son, according to Chambers. All Chambers wrote about Christopher was that he married "Kate Terryberry and went to Canada." Fortunately, Louise Lamb of California, has done some research on Christopher and his family. The information she sent me contained the following details.

Christopher Swackhamer was born 9 Jul 1767 in NJ, USA. Married abt 1792 in PA, USA Died 18 Apr 1840 at Grimsby, Lincoln, UCanada.

Wife: Elizabeth (Kate) Terryberry, Born 1772 in USA. Died 1858 at Grimsby, Lincoln, CanadaW.

Children:

Jacob Swackhamer, born 16 Sep 1793 at Long Valley, Morris Co, NJ USA. Married 1818. Grimsby, Lincoln, UCanada. Died 10 Jan 1874, at Esquesing, Halton, ON, Canada. Wife: Mary Maria Thompson, born 1799, .Grimsby, Lincoln, Ucanada. Died 15 June 1890 at Esquesing, Halton, ON, Canada.

Children:

Susan Margaret Swackhamer, born 11 Dec 1820 Esquesing, Halton, UCanada, Died 22 Jan 1902 at Trafalgar, Halton, ON, Canada.

This is as far as I can go at this point. In studying Mrs. Lamb's charts, I need to contact her to clear up some points before I continue. In the need to meet our newsletter deadline, you will have to wait until next year for additional details.

DEATH OF GROVER CLEVELAND TRIMMER: NOVEMBER 12, 1904

As the son of Lawrence Hager Trimmer (1847-1909), a former NJ State Assemblyman (1889-1891), the founder and president of the High Bridge National Bank, and president and owner of the Middle Valley Trap Rock and Mine Company, 20 year-old Grover took an active part in his father's business interests, as it was required. L.H. Trimmer was considered the richest man in the Middle Valley area.

On Saturday November 12, 1904, Grover decided to work that morning at the Teetertown quarry with his 21 year-old brother, Anthony, who was also his father's personal representative at the quarry. The Trimmers lived about a mile away.

They both brought their lunch to work that morning. Anthony stored his lunch in the blacksmith shop and Grover stored his lunch in the boiler house. Due to the cold weather, some of the workers picked up two sticks of dynamite that were used in the blasting operation, and brought them inside the boiler house to keep dry for later use in the afternoon. The fire in the boiler house was low and the dynamite sticks were supposedly placed at a safe distance. Everybody at the work site, including Anthony and Grover, knew about the dynamite sticks in the boiler house.

When lunch approached, Grover retreated to the warmth of the boiler house and invited his brother, Anthony, to join him for conversation. As Anthony walked towards the blacksmith shop to retrieve his lunch, the boiler house exploded, tearing the frame building into kindling wood and throwing the metal pipes and structure of the boiler in all directions. The explosion was so loud that it shattered windows of nearby farmhouses.

The workers and Anthony ran to Grover's aid as the debris from the boiler house lied on top of him. Using their hands, they frantically retrieved him from the wreckage, but his body was badly burned and mangled. They placed his unconscious body onto a wagon and drove him to his parents' house, where he died five hours later. The funeral was conducted three days later in the parlor of the home. Many neighbors and friends paid their respects.

Grover was buried in the Lower Valley Presbyterian Church cemetery. His father never recovered from the tragedy and died five years later. Anthony died in 1931.

Thank you to Eileen Stokes for the above summary from an article in "The Hackettstown Gazette" (11/12/1904). There may be some type of monument/ memorial coming up this fall in relation to this tragic event (100 years). If anyone has a photo of Grover C. Trimmer, the committee would be very interested in borrowing it for this memorial. Contact your editor. Grover and Anthony were two of the children of Elizabeth Dufford and L.H. Trimmer.


