Communication from Members and Friends

October 20, 2008. **Diana Swackhamer** sent a clipping from the "Independent Republican", July 15, 1898. **John Swackhammer**, a Susquehanna county farmer, rose to the rank of sergeant in the Army of the Potomac. After the disastrous battle of Fredericksburg, Swackhammer's name appeared in the long roll of "missing." Without hearing from him for months and years, his wife and little ones mourned for him as dead. In 1898 the youngest son, **Stephen**, enlisted in a Philadelphia regiment and while in a camp at Falls Church, Va., he entered a restaurant. Stephen engaged in conversation with the aged proprietor and learned he formerly lived in Pennsylvania. Being from that home state they continued and it was revealed the proprietor was John Swackhammer, the father of Stephen. "After the battle of Fredericksburg he languished in Andersonville prison for a long period, during which he was wrecked in health and strength. Then followed years that were a dead blank. When reason was partially restored he had forgotten his own name, his family and the name of the State from which he came. Within a month all the events of his life have passed in panorama before his vision." John Swackhammer returned "back to his loved ones among the hills of glorious old Susquehanna county."

Necrology

Russell "Jack" Todd Dufford Jr., 82, of Lynchburg, died Monday, April 27, 2009, at Lynchburg General Hospital. Born in Towson, Md., on Oct. 20, 1926, he was a son of the late Russell T. Dufford Sr. and Esther Price Dufford.

The Dufford family were one the nine original families that came out of the Rhine Valley in Germany to America in the 1730s and settled in what they named "Germany Valley" in the northwest corner of New Jersey. The name was changed to the Indian name "Long Valley" during World War I.

Mr. Dufford graduated from E.C. Glass High School in 1943 and Lynchburg College in 1949. He received his master's degree from the University of Virginia in 1959. During the years from 1949 to 1993, he taught school and retired from Rustburg High School in the Campbell County School District as a teacher, coach and athletic director. He was a member of West Lynchburg Baptist Church, Hill City Lodge 183 AFandAM and was the historian for the Swackhamer-Dufford Genealogical Society. He served his country in the U.S. Naval Reserves.

Jack is survived by his loving and caring family, friends and associates. The family received friends on April 30th at the Diuguid Funeral Home. A Celebration of Jack's Life and Faith was held on May 1st at Diuguid Waterlick Chapel on Timberlake Road, with the Rev. Leslie Whealton officiating. Interment followed in Spring Hill Cemetery. Russell was dedicated to genealogy and our Society. He was featured in "Introducing Society Officers" in the Summer 2006 Bulletin and we will truly miss him. Our sincere condolences are extended to the family.

Clifford O. Apgar, 88, of Annandale, NJ died October 24, 2001 in Hunterdon Medical Center, Raritan Township. He was an assistant county engineer for Hunterdon County in Flemington, NJ for 34 years, retiring in 1976. Before that, he was a state highway inspector, an assistant county engineer for Hunterdon County and a general land surveyor for the late Clarence Miers in Annandale.

Born January 8, 1913 in Califon, he was a son of the late Mabel Trimmer Apgar. He moved to Annandale in 1945. He was a member of the Annandale Reformed Church and served on the Consistory. He served in the Army in the Advanced Specialized Training Program during WWII. He received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from Union College in Schenectady, NY and attended the University of Iowa and the University of Wyoming. He was a 52-year member of the Herbert Cawley Post of the American Legion in High Bridge and was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha International Alumni Association. He is survived by his wife, the former Marian Miers (now deceased); a sister Ruth Alpaugh of High Bridge; and two nephews. Burial was at Union Cemetery in Lebanon, NJ.

In genealogical research one finding often leads to the discovery of another, but not necessarily in the same time-frame or by the same person. Here is an example of the linkage of discovery that took from 1862 to 2009 to complete. **John R. Swackhamer** (b.10 May 1815; d. 13 Feb 1901) was living in Clinton, Holmes County, Ohio when he enlisted in Captain Voorhes' Company of the Ohio Infantry, 65th Regiment, Union Army. He wrote a letter dated 10 May 1862 to his sister, **Mrs. Daniel H. Powelson (Eliza Swackhamer)**, Lesser X Roads, Somerset County, NJ, which was saved, eventually transcribed from German/English and printed in the S-D Bulletin. The letter provided clues that proved John was the son of Rulif and descended from Conrad, Jr., Conrad Sr., and Samuel. I included the letter in my book, *The Emigration of Samuel Swackhamer*, which **Merlin Leroy (Roy) Swackhamer** of Lake Oswego, OR read this year. The similarity of the information that I had assembled about John R. reconciled with information that Roy had been given 30 years earlier by his Great Uncle Harry, about his g. grandfather, **Josephus Seaf Swackhamer**, **son of John Swackhamer** and his wife **Eliza Prost.** One circle is complete; another can now begin!

Ninety-five Twice: One Hundred Ninety Years of Living History

My mother, **Lois Watters Brasher**, celebrated her 95th birthday on March 22, 2009. When Lois was an infant, she attended the 95th birthday celebration of her great-great grandmother, **Eliza Hopkins Swackhamer** (1819-1915). This was on August 4, 1914 (one day after "the guns of August" began the First World War). The birthday celebration was held at the home of one of Eliza's daughters, Mrs. L.H. McPeak, at Pleasant Hill (Ironia) near Chester, NJ.



Beginning on Eliza's 80th birthday in 1899, 50 to 100 of her Swackhamer descendants gathered every anniversary for a "bountiful repast" and celebration of the "the venerable old lady." The Rev. William Delp of the German Valley Lutheran Church always was in attendance to make remarks. Eliza's last birthday celebration was in 1914. My great grandmother, Harriet Skellenger Swackhamer Clark (1864-1955), and my grandmother, Bessie Swackhamer Clark Watters (1885-1973), always told me that these gatherings were the beginnings of the Swackhamer-Dufford Reunion, which they attended in the 1940s and 1950s. (They were partially right.) Eliza Hopkins Swackhamer was descended from Stephen Hopkins of the Mayflower. Her mother was a Bodine.

Lois Ann Watters graduated from Douglass College (then New Jersey College for Women) in 1935 and did graduate work in organ performance, with the renowned Dr. Clarence Dickinson, at Union Theological School of Sacred Music (now Yale School of Sacred Music). She was organist at virtually all of the large Morristown churches in the 1930s and 1940s and played at Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City.

Lois and Julius Brasher are both 95 and have been married for 68 years. Both are in good health and they live in their own home at my father's ancestral home place in north Alabama.

Keynote Speakers Carla and Allan Messinger of Native American Heritage Programs The History of the Lenni Lenape and Their Interactions with Early European Settlers

This year, we're excited to have as our keynote speakers Carla and Allan Messinger of Native American Heritage Programs (www.lenapeprograms.info). Many of you are likely aware that Jacob Dufford Sr. married a Lenni Lenape woman after the death of his first wife, and lived with her tribe for some time. Indeed, some of us are descended from their offspring. With that in mind, Carla and Allan will talk about the history of the Lenni Lenape and their interactions with early European settlers, including what this intermarriage would have meant to both families and their communities.

Carla Messinger is a Founder of the Lenni Lenape Historical Society and Museum of Indian Culture and was its executive director for over two decades. While under her fulltime volunteer leadership the organization evolved into an all-volunteer organization described in a 2000 assessment funded by the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts as "a remarkable institution" that "offers rich and diverse programs, a host of activities, and resources for learning that reflect the best tradition of museum educational efforts." During her tenure as the sole administrator and primary educator at the Museum, she developed regionally-unique educational and cultural programs, exhibits, and events attended by 185,000 visitors. Carla is a descendant of the Lenape Indians.

Allan Messinger is highly knowledgeable docent and a veteran educator with 32 years experience as a History / Foreign Language and English teacher in the Allentown, PA School District. He pioneered the Gifted Elementary Program and taught German to 4th Grade Gifted students for 20 years.
