Dear Members and Friends:

The genealogical highlight of my year was a trip to Altlussheim, Germany, with my wife **Sharon** and 16 year-old grandson **Clay Swackhamer**. The story of our adventure is included in this issue. Aside from seeing and walking in the places where **Samuel Schwechheimer (Swackhamer)** lived before coming to the American Colonies, the most exciting activity was meeting with descendants of Samuel's siblings and uncles, who continue to live in Altlussheim and nearby villages. See the genealogical descendency chart for **Norbert Schwechheimer** in this issue Norbert and I are both 10th generation descendants from brothers **Samuel** and **Mathäus**. The brothers differed in age by 8 years and we by 13, Norbert being the younger.

Although I have visited Germany on previous business and tourist trips, using the services of **Dr. Wolfgang Gram's** firm, Routes to the Roots, Inc., which specializes in family history tours, made a huge difference in understanding and satisfaction. If a sufficient number of members and friends are interested in replicating this experience, the Swackhamer-Dufford Genealogical Society will do a group tour to Germany from August 24 to September 2, 2010. The group tour will include a visit to the church and village where the children of Jakob DuFort (Dufford) were baptized and also to the area of the Neckar River where several *Love and Unity* families originated. Our annual reunion was held on July 25 at Zion Lutheran Church in Long Valley. **Carla and Allen Messinger** were the keynote speakers. They spoke on the history of the Lenape Indians and their relationship with the early settlers of German Valley. They spoke of cultural differences, white settler and Indian interactions and the challenges of inter-racial marriages. **Clay Swackhamer** presented a slide show of his impressions of Altlussheim and the surrounding area and people. **Bill Cramer** presented updates on the "Continuous Dufford Research Project," and I provided an update on the findings of the "Swackhamer Surname DNA Study." Officers were elected for 2010 and the catered luncheon by Califon Foods was enjoyed by all.

Co-Treasurers **Eileen and Daniel Corritori** reported that we are solvent, but just barely. Donations were down substantially from last year. They estimated that it costs about \$2.50 to mail the Bulletins to each member annually so the need to shift to email distribution and more website dependency is rapidly increasing. In the business meeting we agreed to insert a donation envelope in this issue. I urge you to use it and consider a gift to support the volunteers who keep our Society going.

June 15, 2009. Exchanged emails with **Mike Logan (D)** of Forest, VA, a relative of **Russell (Jack) Dufford Jr.**, regarding Jack's genealogy records. Aside from the possibility of a revealing letter from his quest to locate the European origin of **Jacob and Phillip Dufford**, we agreed that much of his information was from already published genealogy materials and not likely to make a significant contribution to the Dufford family history. Just the same, Mike will remain alert for any useful documents as Jack's estate is settled. In September through the help of **John Grier (D)**, Executor for the estat,e and **Richard Price (F)**, Russell's nephew, Russell's genealogy materials were transferred to the S-D Genealogical Society for the use of **Bill Cramer**, Dufford Family Historian.

Bill is researching Leonhard's route from Germany to the Valley. His mother was Adele Neighbour b. 1915; d. 1984. She was from the Hackettstown branch of the family that had little contact with the Middle Valley branch. Hello descendants of Philip Dufford. This ongoing project is an attempt to update any descendant lines of the Dufford/Tufford family tree. Surnames include, but are not limited to Dufford, Trimmer, Gru(o)endyke, Cramer, Beavers, Voorhees, Stout, Neighbor, Weise, Hager, Sharp. My project includes children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and on and on it goes.

At this past reunion I was able to bring with me my newly found 2nd cousin, Carole Ann Trimmer. Due to the connecting work of our Vice-President Carol Trimmer Stout at the 2008 family reunion, I was able to connect, by email first, by phone 2nd and finally in-person, with a 2nd cousin from the one branch of my Dufford/Trimmer line that I have been searching for, for many years. We have since met numerous times and Carole Ann Trimmer has documented the over 125 descendants of Theodore Trimmer and Hattie Timmons. Theodore Trimmer was the son of Nelson Trimmer and Mariah Dufford. Carole Ann was ecstatic to meet me, find out about the descendants of her grandfather, Theodore's, other 8 siblings and travelled up from South Jersey to attend our reunion this past summer.

Carole came a day early and we spent Friday driving all over western New Jersey. I was able to take her to see her grandparents' graves at Pequest Cemetery in Great Meadows, our great grandparent's graves at Union Cemetery Hackettstown and the graves of her grandfathers 7 siblings at Union Cemetery also. We then did a memory-lane-drive around Hackettstown,N.J. where Carole had grown up and she was so pleased to reattach to wonderful memories. Over the years I have been in touch with many Canadian families, mainly from Ontario who are members of the Tufford family. The late Elma Tufford of Beamsville, ON was especially helpful. My research on the Tufford family has always come to a halt when I reach back to Elijah Tufford (my 2nd G.G.) who was born in New Jersey in 1809 and died in Canada in 1874. Correction in Dufford Genealogical Research by Bill Capell, billcapell@hotmail.com

The error I have found in the Dufford GED originated in the T.F.Chambers book on page 343 where he shows the wife of George Dufford b.1794 to be Elizabeth Neighbor (daughter of Leonard III) b.1800. The 1850 federal census shows his wife was indeed named Elizabeth b.1800, however she was not the same Elizabeth Neighbor who was living in Middle Valley with her widowed brother David and his children, caring for her 86 year old father, Leonard III. The 13 year old Elizabeth in that same household was the daughter of Lawrence Neighbor. I'm not sure who George Dufford's wife was, but I am convinced by the census record that Chambers was wrong. In addition, I need to clear up who Philip Dufford's wife Catrina (Neighbour?) really was before I can proceed with more Neighbour family history.

Genealogy Trip to Altlussheim, Germany by Gene L. Swackhamer

Since the discovery in the 1990s that **Samuel Swackhamer** (Schwechheimer) came from Altlussheim, Germany, several members of the S-D Genealogical Society have visited this small village on the eastern shore of the Rhine River across from Speyer. Their advice was pre-plan your visit and arrange appointments. We heeded their advice.

The German genealogy company, Routes to the Roots, was engaged to assist with advance research, travel, appointments and translation services. It was a good investment. **Dr. Wolfgang Grams**, owner of the company, was our driver-guide and interpreter. He had arranged an 8-day itinerary that included several meetings, interviews and a retracing of the land and water route of Samuel and other passengers that were aboard the *Love and Unity*. My wife, **Sharon**, 16-year old grandson **Clay Swackhamer** and I thoroughly enjoyed traveling with Wolfgang. He is a university professor of world history who has studied emigration from the Palatine. His knowledge of local customs, German culture and history made the visit productive and interesting for us.

We drank toasts to Samuel and the *Love and Unity* passengers, who had their wine stolen during the Atlantic crossing. We even drank the toasts after we had read that the pastor had written in the Altlussheim Lutheran Church records (similar to church council minutes today) that "Samuel drank too much; he drinks two times too much, he drinks his shoes!" (Note: In 1730 a pair of shoes cost a peasant worker about 3 months of wages, so squandering one's meager income on drink was indeed a sin.) According to Ewald Ballreich's translation of the old church records, Samuel had another black mark from fathering a child out of wedlock with **Kunigunde Zöller** in 1720. Samuel was 19 years old. I searched the 1720 Zöller family records and found a daughter born to Kunigunde. Ms. Zöller married a couple of times subsequent to 1720. I felt that some of our German cousins were watching for my reaction to this new knowledge. I told the oft repeated story of genealogy: "If you like what you have been told about your family stop your genealogy inquiry. If you go ahead, learn to dance with the skeletons that emerge!" Perhaps in his American life, Samuel redeemed his character. That might be the next chapter of this story. So, in addition to all the economic, religious and personal family tragedy reasons for Samuel to leave Germany for the New World, we may have discovered another reason—his tarnished religious and social standing in Altlussheim.

While visiting Altlussheim we tried to immerse ourselves into the community for a few days. We stayed at the local Blautannen Inn, where by coincidence; **Joachim and Hiltraut (Schwechheimer) Blaschke** were celebrating their 60th wedding anniversary. The family invited us to join them for coffee and dessert and to meet some other Schwechheimers, which we were pleased to accept. Sharon now has Mrs. Blaschke's recipe for a "real German Linzer tort."

With advanced newspaper publicity of our arrival, Wolfgang's efforts to secure appointments and arrange an openended invitation to all Schwechheimers to join us at a local beer garden for drinks and dinner, was very successful. For a few days in Altlussheim we were really busy. **Pastor Esther Kraus** came on her bicycle to meet us at her church with the lone surviving 1584-1780 church record book showing the birth, baptisms and marriages of Daniel, Samuel and other Schwechheimers. **Dr. Wilfried Schweinfurth**, a local historian in the mayor's office, gave us a walking tour of Altlussheim explaining its significance as a Rhine River crossing point, a training ground for Roman armies and the breadbasket for whomever was in power. Those circumstances alone were enough to cause many peasant farmers to flee.

Maria Schwechheimer, widow of **Karl-Heinz** was the first relative we met and the last to bid us farewell. She came with Pastor Kraus to greet us. Maria loaned us her husband's book on Schwechheimer family history, showed us the local cemetery and family graves, took us to see the local park and lake (a favorite picnic site) and gave us post-card photos of Altlussheim. She was a good Schwechheimer family ambassador and spokesperson for her village. Best of all she had copies for us of her husband's genealogy charts, which showed Samuel's parents, uncles and his siblings and their descendants. (See separate story in this Bulletin).

The charts from Maria led us to the home of **Norbert and Traudel Schwechheimer**, a local electrician. Norbert is a direct descendant of **Mathäus**, an uncle of Samuel, the American immigrant. The fathers of Mathäus and Samuel were brothers and the sons of Daniel. We determined that we are both 10th generation from Daniel (1657-1719). Our evening around Norbert and Traudel's dining room table with Wolfgang translating was a highlight of our visit. Using Norbert's computer and Google Earth, we were able to show them our farm on Yeoho Road in Sparks, Maryland. Just one more example of how our world is shrinking in our lifetime.

We met with **Hartmut Beck**, Bürgermeister (Mayor) of Altlussheim. He was happy for our tourist business in his village and through Dr. Schweinfurth's efforts, gave us two of Dr. Schweinfurths's books on the history of Altlussheim and a very useful book that is a genealogy compilation of the names and family records from the old church records.

At the regular Sunday church service, we were introduced as American family visitors by Pastor Kraus. By coincidence, at that service, a special recognition of three departed souls included a Schwechheimer. So following the service, we were able to meet with additional family members including **Friedhelm Schwechheimer** of Geinsheim.

I asked family members about the origin of our name. Although there is a Palatinate place named, Schwegenheim, that might have some relevance, most thought that the name in someway related to a long-ago local practice of taking work horses at the end of the day to the "Schweche," a low or weak water swale by the Rhine, to cool down before returning them to their stables. They felt that their ancestors were associated with that service.

We also learned that several of the Altlussheim Schwechheimers were confused about the interest of US and Canadian visitors in their village. They did not understand that the names. Swackhamer/Swackhammer/Schwackhamer, were corruptions of Schwechheimer. The story of Samuel's immigration and 1730/31 English phonic spelling of his name, which we have learned through the book Love and Unity, is mostly unknown to them. Immigrants since the mid-1800s have not had the language translation challenges of Samuel and thus the S-D Genealogical Society also has members with the Schwechheimer name spelling.

What next? Does the story end here? Several future activities are possible. (1) A group genealogy tour to Altlussheim, the Palatinate villages of other *Love and Unity* passengers, and visit to the possible baptismal church of **Philip and Jacob Dufford** might have appeal. (See Tour proposal in this Bulletin). (2) Correspondence between German and American family descendants using local translators or Google language translation can reveal other interesting family stories. (3) I hope to eventually find a couple of Schwechheimer males who will be willing to participate in the Ancestry Family Tree Swackhamer Surname DNA Study, which would further confirm our family connections.

ANNOUNCING 2010 GENEALOGY TOUR TO GERMANY

Want to see Altlussheim, Germany where Samuel (Schwechheimer) Swackhamer was born, baptized, married and departed in 1730 for America? Would you like to meet and talk with descendants of Samuel's siblings living there now? Then, travel on to Elsaß Langensultzbach, France, where Hans Phillip Duffort (known to be Phillip Dufford) of Sultzbach, Germany saw his children baptized.

We will stand in the Worms Cathedral where Martin Luther said "Here I stand. ...God help me." Drink a toast to the departing Palatine emigrants of the sailing ship *Love and Unity* on the shore of the Neckar River at Neckargemund and ride a river boat on the Rhine. We'll visit Heidelberg and Bern, Switzerland to learn more about the history of Palatine and Huguenot emigration.

Preliminary plans are for a 9 night (10 day) program beginning and ending in Frankfurt, Germany. At current exchange rates, the cost based upon double occupancy is estimated to be \$2,640.00 to \$2760.00 per person (excluding air fare, one meal per day and incidentals). A single traveler additional surcharge will be approximately \$405.00. Program costs include a driver-translator guide, very nice local 3-4 star hotel/inns with breakfasts, at least one group meal per day, and all land and river transportation, tolls, and entrance fees. You will be responsible for air travel to and from Frankfurt. You also may want to plan independent travel before or after this tour.

The tour will begin in Frankfurt on August 25 and end there on September 2. **Dr. Wolfgang Grams** will be our tour coordinator. He is President, Routes to the Roots, Inc. (see story of travel to Altlussheim in this Bulletin), is a Professor of world history at Oldenburg University and is an experienced leader of genealogy tours.

The price range quoted above is for 7 passengers on a 9-passenger Minibus (\$2,760.) and/or for 14 passengers on a small tourist bus (\$2,640.). The tour will be a "GO" with seven or more participants. If the count is more than 7, but less than 14, the cost will be slightly less than the 7 person group fare. The tour will be limited to no more than 14 to permit ease of travel and language translation.
