The following information on **Magdalena Dufford**, provided to us by **Ann Cook**, is not in the Chambers Book, *Early Germans of New Jersey*. Thank you, Ann, for this valuable addition.

Magdalena Dufford (daughter of <u>George Stephen Dufford</u> and <u>Anna Mary Trimmer</u>) was born 27 January 1779, and died 10 March 1865. She is buried as Mary A. Wack in the Middle Valley Cemetery. She married <u>Andrew Wack</u>, son of <u>Rev. Casper Wack</u> and <u>Barbara Leidy</u>. Children of <u>Magdalena Dufford</u> and <u>Andrew Wack</u> are:

## **Houses Associated with Genealogy**

"The Mary Trimmer House" (top) is located at 411 West Mill Road, Long Valley, NJ (Middle Valley). This property represents the union of the Duffords and Trimmers. George Stephen Dufford (1741 – 1817), grandson of Philip Dufford, married Mary Anna Trimmer (1743 – 1826), daughter of Matthias Trimmer.

The Raritan Inn (bottom) is located on the same road west of the Mary Trimmer House. The address is 528 County Route 513, Califon, NJ (Middle Valley). After arriving in 1732, **Samuel Swackhamer** built a stone bank house on this site. Rev. Casper Wack bought the property in 1797 and built a mill adjoining the barn area. In 1872 Lawrence Hager **Trimmer**, owner of the Middle Valley Trap Rock & Mine Company, purchased the property. He was married to Elisabeth Dufford, the greatgranddaughter of George Stephen Dufford and Mary Anna Trimmer. In 1898 Lawrence and Elisabeth built the Victorian house on top of and around the Swackhamer house – that stone house still remains in the basement. (See Summer 2007 Bulletin for additional information.)

Both homes were featured on the Washington Township Historical Society Historic House Tour in 2006. The "George S. Dufford House" on page 6 was on the 2003 tour and also previous tours.

# The Pioneers of Washington Township by George S. Dufford Reviewed by Bill Capell, billcapell@hotmail.com

I first became aware of this book in May of 2009 while researching my Neighbour family ancestors in Virginia Allen's 2005 book <u>A History of Washington Township</u>. On the very first page she states that Captain John Neighbour attended the first township meeting in January of 1800 and refers to <u>The Pioneers of Washington Township</u> by George S. Dufford as the source of her information. This was very exciting because very little is known about John Neighbour so my next move was to contact Shelley Heretyk at the Washington Township Historical Society for help in locating a copy of the book.

This early history of Washington Township was written by George S. Dufford (1864-1945) as a collection of 18 newspaper articles. It was published with accompanying photographs in 1932 in the *Plainfield Courier-News*. They have now been compiled into a modern .PDF computer file which is available from the Washington Township Historical Society and can be downloaded from their website. These are not transcriptions but rather photographic scans of the original newspaper clippings.

The first four articles are devoted to an engaging history of 18th century Long Valley. The bulk of the early data seems to have been taken from Theodore Chambers 1895 book <u>The Early Germans of New Jersey</u>. The author also covers in some detail the original Budd and Logan land grants as well as subsequent leases and property developments.

The next thirteen articles are mostly taken from the journal found in the attic of George McLean's store that covers the period from October 1799 to April 1839. The journal contains the earliest Washington Township financial records and the minutes of the early town meetings. The author mixes the exact wording from these records, complete with misspellings, with his own interpretations and comment. It gives the reader a wonderful insight into the daily lives of people who might otherwise have remained mere names and dates on a headstone. An example of this is the case of one of my ancestors named Jacob Neighbour. Most readers will recognize him as the original builder of "The Neighbour House" the Long Valley bed & breakfast on West Mill Road. In article Number 17 we find that in December 1836 Jacob Weise Neighbour won a judgment against Washington Township on account of the sale of the David Trimmer farm which by May of 1838 had reached the Supreme Court. In the end the township paid Neighbour \$104.40 and he dropped the suit.

Although to a large extent the contents of this book have been included in Virginia Allen's book, it still makes exciting reading. In the process of writing this review it was necessary to refer back to Virginia Allen's book and her first paragraph comment about John Neighbour that got this whole mystery started. I can now certify that this is nothing more than an incorrect Anglican conversion of a German name. The individual in question was born Johannas Leonhard Nachbar in 1741, probably in Philadelphia. His Rufnamen (call name) is actually Leonard not John and was correctly used in the Dufford book. He had a son who was indeed called John Neighbour who died sometime before his father in 1806. Mystery solved!



Pictured above is "The George S. Dufford House" located at 422 West Mill Road in Long Valley, NJ (Middle Valley). The grandson, George Dufford (b. 1794, d. 1864), of George Stephen Dufford and Mary Anna Trimmer on pgs 3 & 4, purchased this property and several hundred acres in 1853. This George was married to Elizabeth Neighbor. In 1864, the house passed to their son Elijah (b. 1828 - he married Susan Swackhamer) and remained in the Dufford family until 1965.

The house is named for George S. Dufford (b. 1864, d. 1945), historian, poet, journalist, and author of *Pioneers of Washington Township*. He used it mainly as a summer residence.

## Genealogy Tour to Germany - August 25 to September 2, 2010

If you have ever wanted to see the land of our ancestors, I can think of no better way than this personally guided tour by **Dr. Wolfgang Grams** of Routes to the Roots, Inc. In 2009 I took my family on a very similar tour and we were delighted with Dr. Grams attention to details, arrangement of appointments, flexibility to change the itinerary (within reason of course), knowledge of German and world history, his sense of humor and his ability to book delightful hotels and inns off the beaten tourist path. He will do all this and more for you in 2010.

As of this writing we have six people committed to the trip, assuring that it will be a go, and we would like to add another 3 or 4 (the comfortable limit of a BMW tour van.). - Orientation breakfast at the Frankfurt Steigenberger Hotel, Wed., August 25
- Travel to Koblenz and overnight at Schloss Engers, former music school
- Thur. August 26 visit castle Mark Schloss and travel up the Rhine to Johannisberg Cloister for overnight and dinner.
- Fri. August 27 visit Worms and cathedral of Martin Luther's "Here I stand" declaration. Drink a toast to the passengers of *Love and Unity*, who bought wine here and travel to Altlussheim for 3 nights at Luxhof Hotel.
- Sat. Aug. 28 am tour of Speyer and lunch in Altlussheim with Dr. Schwinforth, Altlussheim historian, Schwechheimer descendants and Pastor Kraus. Evening music concert with Friedhelm Schwechheimer (Germany's oldest male choir) during Kerwe (festival) in Geinsheim (15 Km from Altlussheim.) Return to Luxhof Hotel.
- Sun. Aug 29 Church in building that was under construction as Samuel was leaving in 1730 and dedication
  of kinetic art (similar to Raritan Inn) in Mayor's courtyard. Farewell beer garden party.
- Mon. Aug 30 Full day excursion to trace Dufford Family history in Sulzbach, Langensulzbach Elsaβ.
   Overnight enroute to Bern.
- Tues. Aug. 31. In Bern. Explore the religious traditions of Huguenot emigration and Anabaptist movement. Hotel Bern.
- Wed. Sept 1. Depart Bern for "Romantic Road" return toward Frankfurt. Visit Rotenburg ob der Tauber and Sommerhausen, home of Franz Daniel Pastorius, founder of Germantown, PA, in 1683, the first permanent German settlement in America. Hotel enroute.
- Thur. Sept. 2. A final toast to passengers of the *Love and Unity* on the banks of the Neckar River. Return to Steigenberger Hotel in Frankfurt for departures or additional travel.

The cost for the land tour, double occupancy, is approximately \$2700 and for a single traveler is \$405.00 more. # Swackhamer Surname DNA Project Update by Gene L. Swackhamer

Previous issues of this *Bulletin* (Winter 2007 page 10 and Summer 2008 page 8, accessible on the Society's web site) describe this study and its objectives. The study is an ongoing effort to link Swackhamer descendants to Samuel by proving that Swackhamer males without a clear proof of descendency have the same Y chromosome DNA markers as those male Swackhamers who have traditional proof of their descendency from Samuel. To date participants have not been disappointed. All of the Swackhamer males that have submitted a cheek swab for the 37 DNA marker test to date are related, in that there is a very high percentage (i.e. 95-99 percent) that all have a common ancestor within the past 10 generations—either Samuel or one of his sons.

It would be ideal to have a participant from each of Samuel's known sons. If all provide as good a match as has been obtained to date, then we could say with near certainty that Samuel was the sole progenitor of us all. Certainty cannot be claimed because of the disappearance of George Swackhamer from Massachusetts following the *Love and Unity* trials. He could have had male descendants with the same DNA as Samuel.

This study is open to the public in that any male Swackhamer may participate by contacting Family Tree DNA at www.familytreedna.com and ordering a 37 marker test kit. Those descendants from a Swackhamer with a different surname also can participate, but aside from the interesting anthropological information one gets, it most likely is a waste of money. Your identity can be kept private with the use of a kit number and the DNA data collected from you can be discarded at your direction if you desire. You need not participate through me as Project Administrator, however, I am very willing to help anyone that is interested. The only downside that I have determined to date is the cost, approximately \$200.00 for the 37 marker test. To test a lesser number of chromosome locations will not reach back the desired number of generations at a reasonable confidence level and the 64 marker test is more than necessary.
