Dear Members and Friends:

At the national meeting of Palatines to America in Buffalo, NY, in July 2018, I listened to story after story of people descended from Germanic language speaking regions of Europe. Some had ancestors that worked the pine tar camps of NY in 1709-1710, some came for other reasons as did Samuel Schwechheimer (1731-32) and Philip Dufford (1738). In the 1800s waves of Germanic speaking emigrants came to America along with Irish, Scandinavian, and Southern and Eastern Europeans. In the 1900s emigration continued much of it being war related and still today in the great American experiment of democracy, the "poor and down trodden" still seek the opportunity that America represents. Immigrants are not always welcome. They often live a life of struggle for acceptance. In the long run, however, research shows that their success and failure rate is nearly the same as the population present when they arrived.

Also, throughout all these years, the last one to arrive tends to be one of the first to argue for closing the door whether it is on rural farmland, in suburban living or from perceived infringements on custom and culture. The process of self-governance that appeals to many is not an easy process for intergenerational transfer. Change is often very difficult. I spent a weekend in October at Purdue University and was again reminded of a statement by France Cordova, Purdue's former president, who said that Purdue has transitioned from a majority Caucasian student-body to a majority non-Caucasian. That may be true from a numbers count, but the student leadership and student participation does not yet reflect the massive change now underway. While on campus I saw a men's Glee Club celebrate its 125th anniversary with a concert of 76 mostly all-white male voices, but photos of the student union governing board revealed a 50/50 split—white and non-white, with 5 women and 2 males reflecting leadership transfer.

As we look back to family history, ancestry and genealogical roots, it behooves us to learn the lessons of change, adaptation and acceptance. Each generation needs to pass on its best ideas and mores. Closing the door to change never has worked very well over time. My great grandfather, Elijah Swackhamer, as a 50 year-old farmer, loaded his family and possessions into a wagon and in 1884 left Roseville, Ohio, on the National Road for Indiana. It was a trip of 11 days. He settled in Clinton County near Kirkland. Today, I can drive from Roseville to Kirkland in a little over 3 hours! That is symbolic of dramatic change. From 1540 to date, there has always been a Swackhamer farmer, but that too is changing as the number has dwindled to only one in the U.S. that I know. Does it matter? Perhaps not. We are an adaptive species. Genealogy teaches us that.

Celebrate your family history. Dance with the family skeletons. Pass on the stories that add richness to life. Be your family's historian. Cherish old memories and make new ones. Have a blessed Thanksgiving and a wonderful Holiday Season.

Communications with Members and Friends

She said the summer there is delightful, but she is being cautioned to wait until she has experienced winter before lauding the virtues of Brookfield.

Barbara J. Rudy (S) is living in Dover, PA and is now a widow. She continues to work as a volunteer (over 30 years) at the York Library, mostly on Fridays and Saturdays. She also is related to Hendershots, Colvers and Kerns.

Mrs. Adelia (Dee) Swackhamer attended the July 28 reunion; her first return since the 1950's. She is a spry 89 year old who donated several items to the S-D Society for display at the Washington Township Historical Society museum. One was a very old song book that had been a family possession for many years. She also had genealogy records for Charlene (Swackhammer) Harris (b. 10-12-32 Afton, Chenango County, NY; d. 10-4-2000, probably Avoca, NY). She is the daughter of Roy L. Swackhammer (b. 1-16-03 in Montrose, PA; d. 7-14-91 in Hornell, NY; m. Virginia L. Burelson (b. 6-24-24 Savona, NY; d. 2-12-91 Bath, NY).

Steven F. Firtko (F) in doing some Dufford searching for Donn Dufford came across a business ledger of the Jacob Janeway store transactions with Samuel Swackhamer from 1737 to 1742. This was an impressive finding in that it represents confirmation of several things believed about Samuel, but hard to confirm. Purchases show that he bought sundry farm supplies. It is believed he was a farmer but there are no farm records. He bought items for an Indian, thus showing he did have relations with the native people and might well have prevailed on them to go down the Delaware River to Philadelphia to guide the Duffords and others to German Valley assuring their safe passage.

Bill Asdal (F) did the restoration of the Trimmer house that became the current Raritan Inn B & B. In the process he discovered that Samuel Swackhamer had homesteaded in the structure now preserved in the basement of the Innthe foundation of a simple stone house that was on land leased from Budd. He is now involved in the preservation and restoration of a 1747 house on Vernon Road that was once the home of John Swackhamer, son of Samuel. If you are a descendant of this John or have information about his life in German Valley, Bill would like to know. So would the Editor of this Bulletin. It might add to our knowledge of early Swackhamer life in the valley and contribute another location to the driving tour.

Dr. Wolfgang Grams (F) of Oldenburg, Germany, and the group leader of the 2009 and 2010 Swackhamer-Dufford tours to Altlussheim, Germany, was the speaker at the October 20 fall meeting of the Indiana Chapter of Palatines to America. Sharon and Gene Swackhamer assisted him in his presentations discussing the fateful voyage of the Love and Unity and the genealogy tour experience.

Necrology

Mildred Bernice (Johnson) Swackhamer, widow of Robert E. and mother of our Treasurer, Robert L. Swackhamer, died 8-12-18 at age 94. A memorial service was held on August 18 and the burial service and internment was at the Missouri Veterans' Cemetery next to her husband of 67 years, a Marine Corps veteran.

Mildred was born 1-31-24 in Pleasant Hill, MO and graduated from Smith Cotton H.S. in Sedalia, MO in 1942. In 1946 she graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from the University of Missouri with a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry. She completed a MS degree in Education in 1962. She was an accomplished violinist and played in the Jefferson City Symphony. She loved to play bridge and was still doing so the week before her death. From 1962 to retirement in the 1980s, she taught math and science in Missouri public schools.

She is survived by her brother, Charles Johnson of Jefferson City, by her sons Robert L. of Toms River, NJ and Thomas Swackhamer of Flower Mound, TX and by her grandchildren Brian Swackhamer, Elizabeth Davidson and Robert W. Swackhamer plus numerous nieces and nephews.

72nd Annual Reunion Summary

After weeks of rain along the Eastern Coast, July 28, 2018, broke to sunshine and reasonable summer temperature. The nice day seemed to impart a sunny disposition as members and friends gathered for breakfast and discussion around the display tables. At 9:15 President Swackhamer called the meeting to order with introductions. Mrs. Laura Hamilton, Administrative Secretary for Zion Church, extended greetings on behalf of the church and Pastor Daniel Schroeder, who was on vacation. President Swackhamer then gave an overview of the plan for the day as printed in the program. He encouraged everyone to look for "take home value" as their reward for attending the reunion.

A presentation was given by David R. Reading, Executive Director, of the Mount Amwell Project, Inc., a 501 (c) (3) not-for-profit charity that specializes in saving historic structures and sites such as the "Old Swack Church" formerly the Bethel Lutheran Church of Reverend Lambert Swackhamer. He reviewed the process of securing clear title to the property and efforts to clear trees and brush, improve site parking, locate graves and continue the evaluation of the remaining stone walls that are crumbling. William (Bill) Cramer, Vice President and Dufford Family Historian, followed with an update on the "Ongoing Dufford Family Research Project." Mrs. Annette Sadloski, President of the Washington Township Historical Society (WTHS), spoke of its goals, repairs and improvements beginning this week to the school house museum, and the challenge of getting members to volunteer time to the society. A group photo concluded the morning. Nineteen members, friends and guests attended all or parts of the meeting.

Sharon Swackhamer again served a great luncheon of summer salads—shrimp and pasta, mixed fruit and warm German potato salad. In addition there was ham, other luncheon meats and accoutrements for sandwiches, plus homemade cookies and cakes for dessert. As the luncheon was concluding a brief business session was held. All present were welcome to attend. A moment of silence was held for those members who died in the past year including Nancy Schanes and Mrs. Sadloski's husband. Robert Swackhamer, Vice President and Treasurer, reported \$3,800 in the Peapack-Gladstone banking account. He said our largest cost annually is the donation to community organizations of \$600.00 followed by *Bulletin* production and distribution of about \$600.00 per issue, with the postage portion of that cost currently being donated.

The traditional survey of those present revealed that Adelia (Dee) Swackhamer was the oldest, Steffen Drees was the youngest and Jill and Steffen Drees traveled the furthest for the meeting—198 miles from Cockeysville, Maryland. It was agreed to continue financial support of \$150.00 each to four organizations—WTHS, Zion Church, Middle Valley Cemetery Association and the "Old Swack Church" fund at Mount Amwell Project. All officers will continue for 2019.

In the afternoon session Jill and Steffen Drees gave a power point slide presentation of their recent trip to the German locations of Martin Luther's life. Bill Cramer provided an update on how war in Ukraine has complicated his family genealogy research. Gene Swackhamer led a discussion of the pros and cons of holding a special research meeting of descendants of *Love and Unity* at the 2019 reunion. With only 5 known interested participants to date of the 31 surviving family units, it was suggested that more development time might be beneficial. The afternoon concluded at 3 with a tour of the WTHS school house museum, more desserts, ice tea and coffee and discussion.

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Memories of Long Valley and Research on <u>ancestry.com</u> Part II

In the Summer 2018 issue of the Bulletin, I wrote about tracking my Swackhamer family history on ancestry.com by entering the names of my father and grandfather and then following the trail from there. I easily tracked back thirteen generations to Jacob (1546-1606). What made the search effortless was that all thirteen generations had lived either in Long Valley or a small town in Germany. What started my search was a ponderous family Bible, published in Nurnberg in 1770 and carried to the United States on a perilous sea voyage.

The following is the story of my parents, Bob and Kay Swackhamer, and the small business they ran in Long Valley.

Willow Run

My father developed an interest in machines when he worked with my grandfather, William T. Swackhamer, assembling Ford cars that were shipped as parts to Long Valley. He attended Bucknell University, returning to Long Valley to run the Ford Agency when my grandfather died.

He married my mother in 1942 in the Zion Lutheran Church in Long Valley. They moved to Michigan where my father was a civilian test pilot at Willow Run air base. I was born in Ann Arbor on March 15, 1945.

Mother told me that test pilots' wives never said goodbye—always "so long." I had imagined my father taxiing down a short runway, flying a small fighter plane, so it was a surprise when I googled Willow Run and found a documentary showing that it was an 80 acre manufacturing and assembly factory for the production of B24 fighter aircraft, planes made of 1,225,000 parts. With eighteen-hour shifts, one plane was completed every 55 minutes.

I discovered that the plant was conceived of and built by Henry Ford. So my father went from assembling Ford cars in Long Valley to testing planes built in a Ford plant. I knew that Hitler had a picture of Henry Ford next to his desk and that he pinned a metal on Ford's chest. Hitler was **Time Magazine**'s Man of the Year in 1938. How Henry Ford changed to the man who produced fighter planes to defeat Hitler is a story that deserves more research. Ford built 6,972 of the 18,482 total B-24s and produced kits for 1,893 more to be assembled by other manufacturers.

At the end of the Willow Run documentary, a pilot and three crew members walk out of the hangar to board a plane to test. I realize the pilot climbing into that enormous plane could have been my father. I wonder what it was like to feather an engine on one of those huge planes that had never been flown.

The Braiding Machine

When the war ended we moved to Oakland, California and bought a ranch style house with a rose-covered picket fence for \$7,000. The post-war times were optimistic. Bob got a job as regional sales manager for Stinson aircraft. The Stinson newspaper reported that he had 2,000 hours in the air, beginning in 1932. He trained as a co-pilot for Penn Central Air Lines and instructed Naval cadets in a private contract school. He held commercial, instrument, instructor and multi-engine licenses.

After traveling for Stinson for some time and wanting to spend more time with his wife and new baby, Bob started a flight school with Kay. They bought a small plane. They told me I squealed with delight when they let me take the stick and make the little plane dive.


In 1950 we went to Damariscotta, Maine for my aunt's wedding. My grandfather owned Bay Shore Machine Shop, which had made parts for, and won awards from, the navy during the war.

My father, who already had mechanical ability from assembling Ford cars in Long Valley, worked with my grandfather, Fred Wikstrom, learning to use the lathes and drill presses in the machine shop. I remember the sweet smell of machine oil and the pin-up posters in the bathroom. My grandfather let me run the lathe, but he joked that I had to stand on a sheet of newspaper because I was so short. My Irish grandmother, who had been the receptionist at the Algonquin Hotel in New York during the flapper round table times, cooked lobster which cost \$.25/pound.

My grandmother, my great aunts and my mother were adept at hand-crafts, one of which hand-braided rugs. My father, observing them work, wondered if he could design a machine that would duplicate the art of hand-braiding. This is a picture of my great aunt Annie sewing rugs.

Working in my grandfather's shop, he designed and built a machine to do that. Hand-braiding involves using ten fingers to alternate three strands of wool, one over the other. Bob's machine used three large spools moving in a figure eight pattern to feed wool to a front unit of three smaller cones that folded the wool and moved in synch with the back to create the braid. The machine when finished was 16 feet long and weighed half a ton.





This picture is an ink drawing of the braiding machine. It shows the front of the machine with the cones that folded and braided the strands coming from the large spools in the back. I remember an especially pleasing repetitive clicking sound as the cones circled one another.

In 1952, we moved back to Long Valley and again lived with Aunt Marge in the white house next to the church. My parents started a business designing and producing rugs made by this machine. They rented a two story building on the other side of the stone bridge a short walk from the house. The bottom floor had been a blacksmith shop, the top a big meeting hall, where I played with other children. I recently discovered it was where the KKK met. There was a real skeleton in the closet. The cottage industry business was called "Contour Braided Rugs." They designed, produced and sold beautiful wool rugs, up to 9x12 in size.

Downstairs Bob wound the wool onto the spools and I helped. The strand of braid that came from the front cones fed upstairs through a hole in the ceiling to where Kay sat at a sewing machine. She started with sewing one piece of braid folded back on itself and kept sewing until a 9x12 rug was completed. Bob designed and built a metal table with a fan underneath that blew air through holes to float the rug so that it could be easily turned while sewing. He later sold a number of these tables to carpet manufacturers in the south. We called it the flying carpet machine.

They calculated having produced a million feet of braid.

While New England hand-braided rugs were made from scraps and rags, these rugs were made from the finest wool, dyed to order for designs created for individual homes. And while hand-made rugs ended with a tapering butt end, my mother figured how to splice two ends of a circle of braid into an invisible seam that made the rug reversible—a technique that came to her in a dream. Kay also made handbags out of the braid and one day she put a bag on her head and came up with the idea of a braided hat. Both sold well in the upscale department stores of New York.

Bob was granted a patent in 1955.

The October 1956 issue of *Better Homes and Gardens* featured one of the rugs on their cover.


There was an article in *American Magazine*. The journalist romantically summarized the business "Love Braids a Rug."

After Long Valley, we moved back to Maine, and then to Laconia, New Hampshire, where I went to high school. My father continued to invent under the company name "Mechanical Motions."

In 1963 I followed in my father's footsteps and enrolled at Bucknell University. On holidays I visited Aunt Marge in Long Valley.

One visit that stands out in my mind is Thanksgiving, 1963. We watched the John F. Kennedy funeral with Ann Metz in her stone house by the bridge. Marge died in 1965, having lived her whole life in Long Valley, except for the years she spent at Douglass College.

While researching my ancestry, I did a virtual street tour of Long Valley. Very little has changed since I lived there as a child. I see the white house that was my family home has been painted yellow and red and now houses the Zion Lutheran Parish Center.

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
